**A** Professor of mathematics at the University of Ilorin, Timothy Oloyede Opoola, has described the affinity between mathematics and football saying that based on the theory of pattern movement, he could make Nigeria win the World Cup.

Prof. Opoola gave this disclosure last Thursday (November 10, 2011) at the University of Ilorin while delivering his inaugural lecture, the 97<sup>th</sup> in the series, entitled, “Mathematics: Faith that Works”.

According to Prof. Opoola, there is also a symbiotic relationship between mathematics and faith as it takes a faithful person to be a mathematician. His words: “If a person only believes in things that he or she can see or feel then such a person cannot become a mathematician. Mathematics is an abstract science but which has applications in all branches of science and spheres of life. For example, a woman cooking sliced yam will check a slice after some time if it is cooked. If that slice is cooked, she will just believe that the whole thing is done. She then applied faith and applied what we call in mathematics method of interpolation and the principle of continuity...”

## UNILORIN Radio begins 24-hour transmission

**I**n a development that analysts have described as another first by the University of Ilorin, the radio station of the University, UNILORN 89.3 FM, has begun a 24-hour transmission barely three weeks after it was commissioned by the President, Commander-in-Chief of the Nigerian Armed Forces, Dr. Goodluck Jonathan, represented by the Minister of Education, Prof. Ruqqayatu Ahmed Rufa’i.

The 24-hour transmission began last Thursday (November 10, 2011) as the listening public was thrilled to a non-stop, round-the-clock experience for the first time in Kwara State, if not in the whole North Central zone.

Speaking to *Unilorin Bulletin* on the development, the Station Manager, Mr. Abdulganiyu Durodola, noted that he felt gratified to actualise the vision of the University management, under the leadership of the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, stressing that it was a good development.

## How to move maths forward in Nigeria - Don

Speaking further, Prof. Opoola, a former Dean of Science, University of Ilorin, stated that faith cannot work without patience, a characteristic of mathematicians. “Mathematical problems can take hours and sometimes days, months and years to solve. If one is not patient and believe that he will get the desired result in some mathematical problems, the person may give up. Once one is taking the right steps solving a mathematical problem even if what one is obtaining does not look like the result the person is expecting to get, the person should just continue solving the problem and at last the expected result will emerge because mathematics is faith that works,” he said.

After espousing the kernel of his work in the field of Complex Analysis and Univalent Functions, Prof. Opoola likened the story of his work to the story Moses, whose rod turned into a snake swallowing up the snakes of the magicians. “It can be seen from the selected research works highlighted in this lecture that my results swallowed up many known results in the theory of univalent functions”, he declared.

The M.Sc. graduand of Kharkov State University, Ukraine, former USSR, listed the six goals of mathematics citing Prof. Keith Delvin of Stanford University, and posited that the development of mathematics in Nigeria is hampered by a number of factors.

These factors, he said, are associated with investors' reluctance in investing in mathematical researches, the problem of many industries in Nigeria not being research-oriented, the challenge of graduates of mathematics, having not chosen mathematics originally as their choice course in the university, not returning to schools to teach the subject, the problem of non-mathematics graduates teaching the subject and the problem of mathematics that is not applied among practitioners.

Prof. Opoola, who obtained his Ph.D. from the University of Ilorin, recommended that all political office seekers should be made to have a minimum of credit in mathematics at SSE/GCE Ordinary Level. His argument: “The ability to examine the many angles of a problem is important in finding better solutions. With critical alertness, one who is adept at mathematics readily spots an error and exposes what is wrong, especially if such a person chooses to practise what is right and good for the country and his fellow men. When Plato was asked to recommend a course of study for political rulers, his conception was not a curriculum in political science or public administration. He prescribed Mathematics, because according to him, the habits of thought it developed would enable his rulers to have a conception of truth necessary to the act of governing”.

The lecturer would also want scholarships to be instituted for talented secondary school students so that they can study mathematics at the University level. He suggested further that Visual Mathematics should be introduced in our primary and secondary mathematics curricula as what people see is retained longer than what they hear.

While recommending that government should invest more in mathematics, being the language of Science and Technology without which there can be no sustainable development, Prof. Opoola suggested that a two-year programme, Mathematics for Industry, should be instituted in various universities. “The focus should be on training people in solving industrial problems through mathematical means, developing social and communicative skills and writing reports. The programme should be completed with an eight-month project, which is executed within a professional industrial environment”, he explained.

Speaking at the end of the lecture, the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Is-haq O. Oloyede, who was represented by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic), Prof. Kolade L. Ayorinde, commended the inaugural lecturer saying that his lecture had almost succeeded in making everyone of the audience a mathematician. He also appreciated the audience for turning out in a large number to attend the programme.

## Unilorin and the narrative of service

Observers who are conversant with the mission of the University of Ilorin know the prominent place that community service occupies in the mandate of the University. But many more disciples were converted to the message of sacrifice among the general public as people were influenced collectively and individually through the re-orientation towards service and sacrifice at an incidental post-lecture interaction that turned out to be a meeting of minds directed at motivating Nigerians against the monetisation of all that matter in life.

This national orientation took place at an occasion where memories were relived on how the study of medicine came to be at the University of Ilorin after the convocation lecture of the University of Ilorin, as part of the 27<sup>th</sup> convocation ceremonies, that took place on a memorable Friday, October 21, 2011.

As the convocation lecturer, Prof. John Hamilton, reminisced on his coming to the University of Ilorin in 1978, the spirit of sacrifice, service and excellence that inspired the first generation staff members of the University became palpable. On hand to relive the history were some of the history makers themselves. The first Vice-Chancellor of the University, Prof. Oladipo Akinkugbe, recalled with nostalgia how he was picked from his comfort zone and given a marching order to start a University from the scratch in Ilorin.

Prof. Akinkugbe, who described himself narrated how the host community was very much involved in the new University and how he bargained with the then military government in Nigeria (which included the then Colonel Olusegun Obasanjo and Colonel Ibrahim Taiwo of Kwara State) to have a medical school if he would be involved in the idea of the new University.

Prof. Akinkugbe expressed his happiness with the current leadership of the University noting that if he were to establish a University, he would appoint Prof. Is-haq Oloyede its Vice-Chancellor. He also added that if second term is ever applicable, he would strongly wish that the Vice-Chancellor be given a second term.

In his own submission, Emeritus Professor Adeoye Adeniyi, a former Vice-Chancellor of the University as well, also recalled that in those early days of the University of Ilorin, designing a unique community-driven medical curriculum of the University was a big challenge before the team of local and expatriate experts were drawn to fashion the curriculum out. Emeritus Professor Adeniyi said that it was out of commitment and sense of service that the people who designed the medical curriculum succeeded in surmounting the challenge.

For the former Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Luke Edungbola, who was a young lecturer in those days similarly recast part of his many fond memories. He recalled that the convocation lecturer, Prof. John Hamilton, was one of the first people he shared the joy of his first article publication with. He also recalled that the first conference on guinea worm in Nigeria was initiated at the University of Ilorin medical school and it was held at Kwara Hotels in the 80s. Today, some thirty years after, guinea worm has been eradicated in Nigeria.

The convocation lecturer, Prof. John Hamilton on his own part told the audience of his close working and personal relationship with the then Emir of Ilorin, Late Alhaji Sulu Gambari, to whom he later became a personal physician and friend as they started the Community Based Experience and Services ( COBES) in four locations in Kwara State while the former Vice-Chancellor of Al-Hikmah University, Prof. R. D. Abubakre, also recollected the spirit of inter-disciplinary synergy in those days. Prof. Abubakre recalled that he was a part of the Medical School of the University of Ilorin and despite the fact that he was in the Department of Arabic, he represented the Vice-Chancellor at a particular occasion of the Medical School.

The Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Oloyede, noted at the occasion that the University of Ilorin conceived by the founding fathers was never meant to be a second class institution. He stressed that academics should not just recede to the cocoons of their campus but be part of secondary and primary schools in their communities.
