# Bewaji tasks African scholars to expand frontiers of knowledge

former Dean of the Postgraduate School, University of Ilorin, Prof. Clement O. Bewaji, has challenged scientists and scholars in Africa to do more for the advancement of knowledge through greater dedication to research and scholarship by spending more time in their laboratories and publishing more academic journals.

Prof Bewaji threw this challenge last Thursday (November 11, 20211) while delivering his Valedictory Lecture at the New Science Lecture Theatre of the University.

The don, who was also one time Dean of Student Affairs in the University, noted that while some academic journals in Africa are hardly published annually, the best journals in the world such as Nature and Science are published weekly or monthly.

Prof. Bewaji, therefore, advised that every scientific journal in Africa should be published at least four times a year in order to be more globally competitive and for the purpose of advancing the frontiers of knowledge, towards solving challenges facing humankind.

## No nation rises beyond its teachers' level - Okunloye

he Director of the Institute of Education (IoE), University of Ilorin, Prof. Rotimi Williams Okunloye, has said that there is no society that can attain any level or form of development beyond the quality of its teachers.

Prof. Okunloye stated this last Thursday (November 10, 2021) while participating on '*Table Talk*', a popular current affairs programme of *UNILORIN 89.3 FM*, the official radio station of the University of Ilorin. The programme was anchored by Mr. Temitope Olawuyi, the Station's Head of Programmes.

The Director, who was on the programme to provide enlightenment on the delayed commencement of the 2021 Contact Session of the University's Sandwich programme, being run by the IoE, said that it was in realisation of the importance of qualitative teachers to man the nation's school system that the University of Ilorin established the Institute of Education 40 years ago.

Prof. Okunloye opined that the main target of the Institute is the production of adequate and competent manpower for the development of the teaching sector in order to assist in the nation's human capital development.

The renowned academic described the Institute of Education, University of Ilorin, as one of the best Centres for teacher training in Nigeria and the flagship of the nation's most sought after University, which has produced world class scholars teaching in Nigerian universities and similar institutions across the world.

Prof. Okunloye disclosed that the Institute would commence its 2021 Contact Session very soon, saying that the programme, which should have held between July and October and during the long vacation, was delayed as a result of the perilous COVID-19 pandemic, which disrupted several human activities across the globe.

While saying that the hybrid system

of teaching and learning, which the University of Ilorin introduced, is a plus to the nation's education system, the Director added that the decision to have the programme this time around and through hybrid style was to ensure that opportunities were given to interested candidates for them to be educated without stress.

He added that admission forms into the Institute are available online as he advised interested candidates to take advantage of its availability to broaden their knowledge and get themselves trained as teachers.

Prof. Okunloye explained that the Institute runs programmes leading to the award of Bachelors of Education, Master's degrees in Education as well as Diploma, Certificate and Postgraduate Diploma in various courses in the field of Education.

The Director, who is a Professor of Curriculum Instruction, specifically explained that the Institute runs 28 Bachelor and 17 Master's degrees programmes in various courses of learning. He pointed out that the programmes of the Institute were meant for those who are teachers or intending to be professional teachers, adding that some Professors without teaching background have been trained at the Institute for them to become professional teachers.

Prof. Okunloye opined that others who had obtained Higher National Diploma (HND) as well as first and second degrees and even doctorate but are teaching at any level of education could also take advantage of one or two programmes of the Institute for them to become professional teachers.

On the modus operandi of teaching and learning in the soon-to-commence contact session, Prof. Okunloye said that virtual model would be adopted to reach out to uld be expected to converge at the Institute for examinations.

learners in their respective places of abode and work. He added that lectures and assignments as well as tests would be conducted virtually while students would be expected to converge at the Institute for examinations.

Speaking on the perceived differences between the quality of certificates issued to those who undergo their programmes through conventional means and those who are produced by the Centre, the Director said that there is no difference whatsoever between the two, saying that the process through which the certificates are obtained would not be stated on them.

Prof. Okunloye added that it is the same lecturers who teach regular students that also teach the sandwich ones as they are also exposed to the same treatments and facilities.

The Director, who described the University of Ilorin as the real better by far institution, said that the University is a well manned institution whose personnel are among the best in terms of erudition, professionalism and productivity in Nigeria.

### **Ojuade proffers dance as recipe for sound health**

Prof. Ojuade, who is also the Chairman of **UNILORIN 89.3 FM** Board, noted that regular dance has also proven to be of positive impact on motor fitness and improvement in muscles tone and strength. He pointed out that dance also gives practitioners better coordination, agility and flexibility all of which are needed to live a sound and healthy life.

While saying that there is nothing wrong in taking dance as either a way of life or profession, Prof. Ojuade charged people against the stigmatisation of dancers and their profession.

Prof. Ojuade, who frowned at the reduction of dance to campaign activities by politicians and businesses or as just mere "pleasurable acts", insisted that dancing is an essential part of our culture and that we must stop debasing our culture.

The renowned scholar said that "dances represent our life and deserves better treatment" and not condemnation and debasement, which discourage people from going into the act and art of dance, at least, in public spheres.

Emphasising the importance of dance as a means of boosting the nation's economy, Prof. Ojuade implored the Federal Government to establish "dance hubs" at different strata of the society. He said that such investment will generate revenue through tourists as it will also serve as a training centre for people who are interested in dance as a career.

Prof. Ojuade, who was installed the Aare Alasa of Ifetedo Kingdom in Osun State just last Saturday (November 13, 2021), also advised the government and other stakeholders to commit more resources to research and development in the area of dance studies and practice for people's knowledge to be broadened.

He also enjoined government to organise and fund cultural festivals, performances and exhibitions where dances would be showcased to the rest of the world to

know that Nigeria is not a people without culture.

Prof. Ojuade also canvassed that dance experts and practitioners be accorded "diplomatic treatment" by foreign embassies, nations and members of the international community in order to reduce the stress that are involved in procuring travel documents by the nation's cultural ambassadors.

He also urged the federal government to consider the separation of Culture and Tourism sectors from the present Federal Ministry of Information and Culture so that more efforts can be given to the cultural sector.

He also enjoined stakeholders to work towards greater synergy between the nation's traditional institution and the academia, saying that such partnership will enhance the preservation of our culture including dance. importance to the teaching and study of history, culture, museums and monuments to enable the younger generations have a better knowledge of our past. He explained that "a society devoid of history is on the verge of collapse".

He also urged government at all levels to ensure the proper and consistent documentation of our cultural dances through the establishment of documentation centres as a heritage that would be passed onto future generations.

The lecture, which was presided-over by the institution's Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Sulyman Age Abdulkareem, was attended by dignitaries from far and near including prominent traditional rulers and foremost culture practitioners as well as relations, colleagues, friends and students of the Inaugural Lecturer.

Prof. Ojuade, who is also a lawyer, urged the government to accord more

The Professor of Organic Chemistry commended the Vice-Chancellor of the University, Prof. Sulyman Age Abdulkareem, for deeming it fit to give that golden opportunity to the students of the Unilorin JUPEB Centre to be first considered in terms of admission before any other outsider. While commenting on the effort of the JUPEB Centre, Prof. Usman said that there is tendency for students who graduated from the University of Ilorin JUPEB to have adequate insight into their proposed course of study that can make them to succeed at the University, noting that each subject has four teachers as a way of ensuring effective learning.

The don also disclosed that any student who graduated from the Unilorin JUBEB has the privilege of using their results to seek admission into private, state and federal universities that registered with JUPEB for three years.

Prof. Usman pointed out that the sales of forms for admission into the Unilorin JUPEB began on August 1, 2021 and will close by December, 2021 while the session will end by June next year, assuring that there is still chance for whoever purchased the form now to meet up the next

academic session of the University.

Prof. Usman advised parents and stakeholders to desist from registering their children at coaching centres deceptively called JUPEB centers, stressing that such centers cannot guarantee them admission into the University of Ilorin.

He, therefore, urged interested candidates willing to enroll into the University JUPEB to visit the Centre located within the University's Mini Campus or log onto the University website; <u>www.unilorin.edu.ng</u> to register. 😱 @UniversityOfIlorin

The retired don recalled that he was propelled to form the Bioscience Study Group and venture into journal publishing because he encountered manuscripts of 1979 articles in the list of references which were cited as being in press in 1985, and the situation in this part of the world is yet to be ideal, till date.

Prof Bewaji also reminisced on how he and his colleagues namely Prof. H. O. B. Oloyede and Prof. Musbau Akanji initiated the Biosciences Research Communication Journal saying that "the idea for BRC was conceived in 1987. At that time, we felt, quite rightly, that finance was a major constraint in starting a journal of high quality both in academic content and in printing that would come out regularly and on schedule."

He also narrated how he sent a manuscript for publication in the Nigeria Journal of Scientific Research for about a year and he did not receive an acknowledgment from the editor until after about 14months when the manuscript was returned to him from Zurich, Switzerland, with editorial report that he should revise the manuscript in line with the suggestion of two reviewers.

Prof. Bewaji said that hard work and dedication are the secrets of success, which he imbibed from his mentors as a young scholar, lamenting, however, that he did not succeed in transferring the same attitude to many of his former students despite his repeated efforts. The retired don, who recalled that in his days as a student, he and his colleagues resumed at 8.00a.m and close not earlier than 6.00p.m, saying that such commitment to learn is now uncommon among the present generation of students.

Prof Bewaji recalled the benefits he derived from great mentors such as late Prof. Enitan Abisogun Bababunmi, to whom he dedicated the valedictory lecture, Prof. Odutuga and Dr. Olorunsogo, amongst others.

Speaking at the event, the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Sulyman Age Abdulkareem, commended the valedictorian for his diligence and contribution to academic development in the University, describing him as someone who has time only for academics and one whom he looked up to when he joined the services of the University.

In his own remarks, the former Vice-Chancellor, Summit University, Offa, Prof. O. B. Oloyede, noted that the valedictorian has made his marks in the academic and Bioinformatics, adding that Prof. Bewaji had done a lot to improve the image of lecturers in the University.

Prof. Oloyede also noted that the Department of Biochemistry, University of Ilorin, is proud of the valedictorian, adding that he is a man who had no time for academic politics. He added that Prof. Bewaji came, saw and conquered as he advised younger lecturers to emulate him.

Speaking earlier, the Dean of the Faculty of Life Sciences, Prof Temidayo Oladiji, recalled that Prof. Bewaji was her lecturer during her Postgraduate days and also said that he interviewed her for employment.

The Dean described Prof. Bewaji as a straight forward, humble and exceptional human being under whom he served as the Sub-Dean at the Postgraduate School, saying that he impacted a lot on her for which she was grateful.

Also speaking, Prof J. A. Morakinyo thanked the Faculty of Life Sciences for the innovative idea, which informed the Valedictory Lecture series. He explained that Prof. Bewaji did a lot for posterity and that he was never selfish. Prof. Morakinyo implored others to emulate the foremost scholar so that the society can benefit from them too.

.The event, which featured many testimonials on Prof Bewaji's preeminence, was attended by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (RTI), Prof. M. O Buhari; the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Management Services), Prof. B. F. Sule, Prof. M. A. Akanji, Prof. A. T. Ande, and Prof. Omojasola, among others including former students and colleagues of the retired Professor.

### Adimula advocates COCOPI to boost national peaceful coexistence

Senior Lecturer at the University of Ilorin Center for Peace and Strategic Studies (CPSS), Dr. Ruth Abiola Adimula, has called for the adoption of what she called Corpers for Community Peace Initiative (COCOPI) project by both the Federal Government and the National Youth Service Corps (NYSC) management, as working tool for the enhancement of community peaceful coexistence in the country.

Dr. Adimula made the call penultimate Wednesday (November 3, 2021) at a two-day Capacity Building Workshop on Community Peace and National Integration for members of the Kwara State National Youth Service Corps (NYSC), held at their Yikpata Camp in Edu Local Government Area of the State.

She said, "I wish to advise the government to embrace any initiative that will foster and promote peace and security to the nation. Under this I call on the Federal, States and Local Governments Authorities, including the National Youth Service Corps (NYSC) management, to adopt COCOPI as working tool for the enhancement of community peaceful coexistence, reduction of insecurity and building of inner peace in the country"

Dr. Adimula, who is also the Desk Officer and Coordinator of the Suleiman Bogoro Mediation Project, disclosed that the project was initiated by her in 2019.

"At first, it was planned to be used as a practical class for conflict simulation and conflict resolution platform. So, we started it and it made impact for the University community and the general public. To expand the frontier of what we did, I brought the initiative of COCOPI, which stands for using the Youths Corps members to preach peace and ensure harmonious coexistence across their respective communities or LGAs where they are posted," she said.

The Legal Luminary and Peace Ambassador also explained that after the training, the Corps members are expected to do two peace projects towards peaceful coexistence in the community of their posting, for a period of six months.

She stated that these Corps members are expected to act as peace advocate or ambassadors settle little conflicts and write report that can be used to assess them for awards after six months.

Dr. Adimula said, "This one held in Kwara is to test-run the project and we can see that it's a program that could reduce problem of insecurity in our communities and build inner

peace", adding that "the intention is to also take the project to the national level whereby the Unilorin Centre for Peace and Strategic Studies will collaborate with NYSC at the National level, so that it will be replicated all across the federation".

The don, who also presented a paper on "Alternative Disputes Resolution" at the event, observed that the initiative will, however, improve the inner peace of the Youth Corpers, reduce Youths restiveness and enhance peaceful coexistence in the country.

Earlier in her presentation on Religion and Peace in Africa, the Director of the Center for Peace and Strategic Studies (CPSS), Prof. Oyeronke Olademo, urged the members of the National Youth Service Corps (NYSC) to embrace peace and ensure sustainable peace building across the country, as Nigeria makes conscious efforts to reduce insecurity in some parts of the country to the barest minimum.

She said that the training is targeted at the Corps members based on their exposure from their various institutions of higher learning to issues revolving round peace and security. She explained that two Corps members will be selected, each from the 16 local government areas of Kwara State to undergo training as agents of change in terms of peace building in the society.

Also in the paper he presented at the event, entitled "Understanding Conflict and Peace", Dr. Raji Shittu of the CPSS submitted that both the concept and implementation of the peacemaking and peace-building processes are very central to global peace and security without which sustainable peace is flat.

In her own paper, entitled "Youth as Agent of Peace building", Dr. Abosede O. Babatunde posited that youths are indispensable agent of peace building that must be carried along in the quest for peace, security, national integration and development in Nigeria.

She, however, said that it is imperative to build, foster, promote and inculcate the culture of peace, sense of civic nationalism, patriotism, determination, diligent, industriousness, perseverance, and social justice in the youth to ensure the stability, security and human development of future generations.
