Sambo joins calls for Constitution amendment

renowned expert in Public Law and Head of the Department of Public Law, University of Ilorin, Prof. Abdulfatai Oladapo Sambo, has joined the call for the review of the nation's constitution.

Prof. Sambo made the call while delivering the 278th Inaugural Lecture of the University, titled "Judicialising Politics without Politicising the Judex", last Thursday (April 17, 2025) at the University Auditorium.

The don gave several reasons for his recommendation after enumerating reasons why politics and political activities must continue to be 'judicialised' in the country without exposing or dragging judges to politics (Contd. on page 4)

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Adedimeji tasks translators on ethical use of Al ... VC commends ITA for organising first public lecture in 13 years

he Vice Chancellor of the African School of Economics (The Pan-African University of Excellence), Abuja, Prof. Mahfouz Adedimeji, has called for collaborative engagement and the fostering of a community of practice among translators by creating platforms to share experiences, insights, and best practices on using AI in their works.

Prof. Adedimeji made the call last Monday (April 14, 2025) while delivering the maiden Public Lecture organised by the Institute of Translation Arts, University of Ilorin, at the University Auditorium..

This was as the Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, poured encomiums on the Ag. Director of the Institute of Translation Arts, Dr. Aliy Abdulwahid Adebisi, for organising the first-ever Public Lecture of the Institute, 13 years after its establishment.

In his lecture, entitled "Translation and Translators in the Age of Artificial Intelligence: Confronting Threats and Connecting Opportunities", Prof. Adedimeji noted that bodies such as the Nigerian Institute of Translators and Interpreters (NITI) and the Association for Translation Studies in Africa (ATSA), along with the Association for Translation Studies in Nigeria (ATSN), which are considered the major translation bodies that have emerged in Nigeria, should work more closely together to advance the discipline and serve as support networks for practitioners.

Prof. Adedimeji explained that investment in training for translators, prioritising quality control, promoting cross-disciplinary research endeavours, addressing ethical considerations, expanding language accessibility, highlighting unique human skills, monitoring technological advancements, and supporting inclusive AI development are crucial.

As AI technologies continue to advance, the Fulbright scholar observed that the translation industry faces significant challenges that may reshape its landscape. He said while there is no doubt that these technologies promise enhanced efficiency and accessibility, they also pose threats to the role of human translators, raising concerns about job displacement, quality assurance, and the shifting demand for skills within the profession.

Prof. Adedimeji, who is a former Director of the Centre for Peace and

Strategic Studies, University of Ilorin, said, "Some of the threats to human translators are the possibility of job displacement, diminishing positive perception, quality assurance, skills obsolescence, and changing demands. AI has significantly advanced machine translation (MT) systems, notably through technologies such as Google's Neural Machine Translation (GNMT) and OpenAI's GPT models.

"These systems can perform basic translation with increasing accuracy, threatening the foundational skill set of many translators, particularly those engaged in straightforward text translation. One of the most critical concerns about the rise of AI generally and in translation especially is the potential for job displacement, with automated machines replacing humans. As organizations increasingly adopt AI-driven translation solutions, the demand for human translators may decline."

He, however, said that while the rise of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in translation presents threats and challenges to human translators, it also opens up a spectrum of new opportunities. According to him, these opportunities include the

enhancement of translation tools, the emergence of new roles and specialisations, and the potential for professional growth through the integration of technology.

Prof. Adedimeji, who is also the pioneer Vice Chancellor of Ahman Pategi University, Patigi, explained that the role of human translators will continue to evolve in response to the increasing capabilities of AI-driven translation technologies. Rather than becoming obsolete, he encouraged translators to adapt and embrace new responsibilities that leverage their unique strengths.

He explained that in the age of Artificial Intelligence, translators must not only adapt to new tools but also assert their invaluable role in ensuring that communication remains nuanced, empathetic, and culturally relevant. According to him, the future of translation is not a battle of man versus machine; rather, it is an exciting new chapter where both will coexist, enhancing the way we communicate in our increasingly globalised world.

Prof. Adedimeji added that it is crucial to appreciate that translation is not just an act of linguistic expression but that its essence transcends mere words. "It is an art form rooted in culture, emotion, and context characteristics that AI is still striving to grasp. For this reason, translations produced by those who lack cultural, emotional, and contextual affinity with the materials they translate are not fully trusted. As the role of translators evolves, it is important they understand that they are now more than interpreters of texts they are cultural ambassadors, tasked with bridging gaps in understanding across languages and societies", he submitted.

The D-8 Secretary-General, who noted the need for universities, especially those in the Global South, to work collaboratively in advancing quality education, cross-border research, and innovation, cited Malaysia, Turkey, and Egypt, all D-8 member countries, as hubs of international education and student mobility.

According to him, tapping into the experience and resources of these countries would provide fresh opportunities for students and scholars of the University of Ilorin to enhance their learning and research capacities.

Amb. Imam, who also stressed the importance of investing in digital infrastructure to drive inclusive and globally competitive education, encouraged the university to expand its digital reach by ensuring high-speed internet access, deploying smart classroom technologies, and integrating AI-driven educational tools to improve teaching, learning, and research beyond the physical campus.

While acknowledging UNILORIN's impressive strides, the D-8 Secretary-General challenged the University and other African higher institutions to look beyond traditional educational models and embrace global collaboration.

He, however, cautioned all that the path to globalising education is fraught with challenges, especially in Africa. Imam identified key issues such as resource constraints, underfunding, and infrastructural deficits that limit faculty training and research development, noting that the challenges

are further exacerbated by the migration of skilled academics, which depletes the intellectual capital of many African universities.

The D-8 Secretary General also highlighted the continent's widening technological divide. He lamented that while digital transformation is redefining higher education globally, many African institutions remain unable to fully participate due to unreliable internet connectivity and limited access to modern digital tools. He said these limit opportunities for virtual learning, distance education, and participation in global academic networks.

Despite these challenges, Amb. Imam praised UNILORIN's commitment to academic excellence, noting that several of its specialised research centres align closely with D-8's development goals. He mentioned the Sugar Research Institute of the University, which, he said, has the potential to enhance the sugar value chain within D-8 membercountries through innovation in crop cultivation, processing, and by-product development.

He referenced a recent agreement between Nigeria's National Sugar Development Council and SINOMACH of China for a sugarcane project capable of producing one million metric tonnes of sugar annually, a development, which, he said, UNILORIN is well-positioned to support through research and training.

In the same vein, Amb. Imam identified the Technical and Entrepreneurship Centre (TEC) of the University of Ilorin as a vital partner in D-8's drive to boost Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs). He disclosed that the D-8, in partnership with the Nigerian government, has concluded plans to launch a D-8 SME Centre in Abuja, to be hosted by the Small and Medium Enterprises Development Agency of Nigeria (SMEDAN). He expressed optimism that the Technical and Entrepreneurship Centre could play a significant role in cross-border capacitybuilding for SMEs.

Earlier in his welcome address, the Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, said that the first International Conference of the Centre for International Education was one of the University's major events to celebrate its 50th anniversary.

Prof. Egbewole, whose address was titled "Reinventing Multidisciplinary Scholarship for Sustainable Global Education", advocated for research efforts in global education to embrace a multidisciplinary approach, which he described as the hallmark of scholarship in the 21st century.

Declaring open the historic lecture, earlier, the Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, applauded the bold initiative of the Ag. Director of ITA, Dr Adebisi, describing it as a significant step towards repositioning the Institute for greater relevance and impact.

Prof. Egbewole expressed delight that after over a decade of existence, the Institute was now stepping into the limelight with its maiden public lecture. He added that the event marked a turning point in the Institute's journey, and praised the leadership of Dr. Adebisi for the development.

Prof. Egbewole described the theme of the lecture as not only timely and contemporary but also crucial to understanding the dynamics of a fastevolving global landscape, saying, "Artificial Intelligence is gradually shaping the world, and the fact that the Institute of Translation Arts is interrogating its impact on translation and translators through the voices of erudite scholars is no mean achievement."

He explained that the award is a reflection of the University's commitment to engaging with members of the university community, including students, staff and others.

He added that he was equally

humbled to have been a finalist in the Outstanding Spokesman (Education Sector) category, saying that he was grateful to have been in the company of talented individuals like Dr Fabian Benjamin of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). He said that being shortlisted alongside him was an honour.

Mr Omoniyi said, "Our sights are firmly set on achieving the Vision 1:10:500 of the University of Ilorin, under Prof. Egbewole's guidance, and the accolade confirms we are moving in the right direction, and we won't lose momentum."

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He said, "The constitutional and legal framework for judicialising politics needs urgent amendment. There should be an alteration to the Constitution itself. All ouster clauses in the Constitution and statutes should be removed. There should not be any ouster clauses in a democratic Constitution."

Prof. Sambo, who had served as a resource person and lecturer in nations like South Korea, North Korea, Malaysia and South Africa, pointed out that "a well-managed judicialisation of political issues or disputes prevents the abuse of power by the political class. It also ensures that the majorities do not abuse their powers against those who are stigmatised as minorities or individuals."

The Inaugural Lecturer, who also said that there are nations where politics is not judicialised, submitted that a "well-managed judicialisation also seems inevitable when there is need for the overhauling of the political system", adding that "when injustices or bad practices in a system grow so prevalent to the extent that they become part of the scheme's normal rules of play, the intervention of the courts, an umpire that is to a large extent insulated from the political pressure, is necessary."

Prof. Sambo said, "Judicialising politics has led to the sanctity of the organic document called the constitution", pointing out that "judicialisation will force the political class to abide by the letter, spirit and intent of the Constitution, the main idea being to retain the integrity and sanctity of the Constitution."

The Lecturer further submitted that judicialisation of politics in Nigeria has contributed tremendously to obedience to the rule of law, due process and prevention of anarchy. According to him, "The practice of judicialisation in Nigeria has ensured the promotion of rule of law, due process and has prevented the nation from going through anarchy. The effect of not judicialising politics is that there is the chance that people will resort to anarchy, chaos, confusion. That is why instead of resorting to self-help, people come to an arbiter, which is the judiciary."

Prof Sambo, who is the first

Inaugural Lecturer from the Department of Public Law, also listed some political benefits of judicialisation of politics to include stability of the polity and deepening democracy, reduction in intra-party and legislative internal strife, and evolution of opposition political parties, among others.

Before enumerating several reasons for his call for constitutional amendments, the don listed a few legal impediments to justicialisation of politics to include the very nature of judicial power, strict adherence to an approach to interpretation, ouster clauses, which, according to him, "is another major impediment to the ability of the courts to play any meaningful role in the development of any political system. It curtails the powers of the courts to review or decide political disputes. It is usually an instrument in the hands of the legislature to curtail the court's exercise of judicial review."

On the impediment posed by the issue of locus standi, Prof Sambo said, "Locus standi has been an impediment to judicialisation of political disputes. The approach in Nigeria is now being liberalised as the courts, unlike before, are holding that a citizen of Nigeria has the right to challenge the constitutionality of the acts of government."

Towards ensuring a peaceful polity via the vital interventions of the judiciary without cowing the judges, Prof. Sambo made several recommendations that are hinged largely on tinkering with the constitution. Most especially, according to him "There is need for a new Constitution to reflect the will and original act of the people. This can be through Referendum, or Constitutional Convention or Constituent Assembly whose memberships are elected not for anything but with a mandate to give Nigerians a new Constitution. The present Constitution can be altered to give room for this proposition. The merits of this suggestion are numerous. First, it will confer legitimacy on the Constitution. Second, it will justify the preamble to the Constitution which says "We, the people of the Federal Republic of Nigeria..."

Prof. Sambo also called for a true financial independence for the judiciary to minimise undue hamstringing of Judges, adding that "there is the need to balance financial independence of the judiciary and the conservatism of not wanting to hold money. Thus, the way out is that money should come to the coffers of the judiciary for their utilisation so that they do not go to beg the executive or legislature like beggars."

The don also recommended a constitutional provision that will enable the courts to enforce their orders. He said, "There is the need for armed judiciary law enforcement agents. The President controls the police and armed forces. There should also be a constitutional provision empowering the judiciary to employ its own law enforcement agents answerable to the heads of the courts."

The well-attended lecture was delivered under the chairmanship of the Vice Chancellor, Prof, Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN.



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Egbewole greets Emir of Ilorin on 85th birthday

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

He said that the solar solution is easy to maintain, with zero percent maintenance required for the battery, except for dusting.

Oyeyemi advised end-users to understand the system's limitations, avoid overusing it, and watch out for warning signs. He noted that having electricity solves 90% of problems and that the 24/7 lighting would increase coverage content and creativity. He appreciated the University Management for giving him the opportunity to contribute to the success of the TV

station.

A representative of the UNILORIN TV Committee, Mr Banu Baba Manu, observed that the installation of the solar inverters would connect the station to the larger world. He advised end-users to acquire managerial skills to maintain the system effectively for it to serve its purpose. He also appreciated the University management for the provision, stating that it would project the University's image and make the job easier.

A staff member of UNILORIN TV station, Mr Idris Kehinde Lukman, appreciated the University Management, under the leadership of Vice Chancellor, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, for providing the solar inverters. 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Egbewole charges students to uphold integrity, discipline, excellence

he Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, has admonished Nigerian students, especially Unilorites, to uphold the values of integrity, discipline, and academic excellence for which the University is renowned.

Prof. Egbewole gave the charge last Monday (April 14, 2025) during the 2025 Mojirola Foundation Scholarship Award ceremony held at the University Auditorium Basement.

The Vice Chancellor, who was represented at the event by the Dean of Student Affairs, Dr. Alex Akanmu, congratulated the 20 beneficiaries of this year's scholarship scheme, 12 of whom are from the University of Ilorin, while the remaining eight are from other institutions across the country.

Prof. Egbewole urged the awardees not to take the opportunity for granted, reminding them that they are stakeholders in a lifelong process of growth, education, and service. "You are part of the process today, but you will become the product tomorrow," he said.

According to him, the University of Ilorin has consistently upheld a reputation built on excellence, and it is expected that students who benefit from opportunities such as this scholarship will reflect those values in their personal lives and academic pursuits.

In her speech, the Project Director of the Mojirola Educational Foundation and Senior Lecturer at the Centre for Peace and Strategic Studies, Dr. Ruth Abiola Adimula, explained that the initiative was designed to reduce the burden of education on indigent and highperforming students. She described education as a powerful tool for national development and peace building.

Dr. A dimula expressed appreciation to the successive Vice Chancellors of the University for their unwavering support in hosting the scholarship award presentations over the years. She specifically thanked the current Vice Chancellor, Prof. Wahab Egbewole (SAN), for approving the venue and backing the initiative. She disclosed that over 200 applications were received in just two

weeks of advertisement, demonstrating the enormity of the need for educational s u p p o r t .

In his remarks, the President of the University of Ilorin Student Union, Mr. Victor Agezeh expressed profound gratitude to the Foundation for what he described as a timely and impactful intervention in the lives of Nigerian students. He pledged the Union's continued support for initiatives that promote academic excellence and student welfare.

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UNILORIN made me what I am -- UK investment banker

s the University of Ilorin prepares for its golden jubilee anniversary, a graduate of the institution's Department of Agricultural Economics, Miss Grace Abikoye, has paid glowing tributes to the University for nurturing her to become a strong player in the corporate world. Miss Abikoye, who is now an investment banker in the United Kingdom, explained that her path to

Kingdom, explained that her path to what she is now doing was laid at the University of Ilorin. She explained in an article

published in *TechCabal*, a Londonbased Business magazine, that the University's merit-based system, which rewards the best-performing students, has been creating a system where excellence isn't just encouraged but expected.

At the heart of this culture, Miss Abikoye explained, is The Investment Society (TIS), a student-led organisation existing across different universities that grooms young Nigerians for careers in global finance.

Miss Abikoye, who now works full-time at a leading global investment bank and seconded on a global sustainability initiative in the United Kingdom, said that her role involves more of strategy and project management after she was briefly exposed to the trading floor during her internship before transitioning to a fulltime role.

Beyond her day-to-day role in strategy and project management, where she manages relationships and projects, develops strategies, and travels rather infrequently—but necessarily, Miss Abikoye expressed the conviction that her achievements serve as an inspiration

to many students of the University coming after her.

Miss Abikoye recalled that her path to securing a full-time role at a prestigious global investment bank was not straightforward. She said that she had to persevere, position strategically, and commit to learning from scratch.

As an Agricultural Economics undergraduate, Miss Abikoye said that her introduction to the financial sector began during her time at the University, where she actively sought out opportunities beyond the lecture room. She had joined societies like TIS and attended networking events.

The distinguished Unilorite recalled that the turning point came when she applied for an internship at a top global investment bank despite having applied and failed to secure a spot multiple times before landing the current one early in 2021. The internship, a rigorous ten-week programme, exposed her to global markets, where she rotated on the linear rates trading and FX sales desks.

"I struggled a bit with the core financial concepts at first," she admitted. "But I realised I had a strong ability in relationship management and strategic thinking. I leaned into those strengths."

She said that her resilience paid off. Despite the challenges, she made an impression on her managers and was offered a full-time position while still an undergraduate at the University of Ilorin—a fully sponsored opportunity.

After her internship, she participated in programmes such as the BCG Aspire Programme and the CFA Research Challenge, which strengthened her understanding of sustainability and finance—two areas that would later prove instrumental in the role she plays today.

Beyond her core responsibilities, the Unilorite has found immense value in exposure to leadership at the bank and initiative.

"I support executives with key stakeholder meetings. It gives me the opportunity to understand industry policies, innovation, and the thought processes of leaders," she said.

Speaking on the rising profiles of Miss Abikoye and other Unilorites, the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, said that he was not surprised with the growing positive trends as Unilorites are trained to dominate their environments positively.

Prof. Egbewole, who spoke through the University Director of Corporate Affairs, Mr Kunle Akogun, encouraged Miss Abikoye and her colleagues to continue to keep the flag of the University flying, saying that all they needed to excel has been inculcated in them while in the University.

The Vice Chancellor encouraged other past and present students of the University to emulate the industry and integrity of Miss Abikoye for them to also excel in whatever career they pursue.

The Professor of Jurisprudence and International Law stated that the multidisciplinary approach is about integrated, interconnected, and interdependent models or methodologies that can bring scholars together across disciplines for the purpose of promoting original, incisive, developmental, and sustainable research efforts. He pointed out that global collaboration will break down traditional models while embracing community engagement with s t a k e h o l d e r s. While calling for the permanent dismantling of the silo relationship between international institutions of higher learning, the UNILORIN Vice Chancellor said that global education finds theoretical solace in the intellectual fanfare of internationalisation. Hence, he said that the silo between global education and international education is temporary. "Let us break it with all sense of honesty as we move forward", he added.

Prof. Egbewole said, "The essence is for inclusive education, and the current direction is the breaking down of barriers of 'my father's farm as the biggest farm' to accommodate the 17 Sustainable Development Goals, which include zero hunger, quality education, decent work and economic growth, sustainable cities and communities, and partnerships for the goals". While noting that the

University of Ilorin, which has been adjudged the most sought-after University in Nigeria for the 10th consecutive year, was poised to globalise education, the astute administrator said, "Seventy-two hours ago, a University of Ilorin undergraduate Kazeem Sanusi, a 400-level Mathematics student, set a new Guinness World Record for the 'Longest Mathematics Lesson,' spanning 31 hours, 42 minutes, and 54 seconds; and two days ago, we made history in this University through the successful inaugural public lecture hosted by the Institute of Translation Arts. My joy is that the connection between setting global records in Mathematics tutorials and translation in the digital era is equally linked to the evincing positivism that can be found in global education, and in its corollary of international education. As a University, we are poised to globalise education.'

In a chat with UNILORIN Bulletin, the Director of the Centre for International Education (CIE), Prof. Lateef Onireti Ibraheem, explained the urgent need for education to transcend local boundaries and evolve into a truly global experience.

Prof. Ibraheem noted that while



the vision of globalised education is compelling, the path toward its realisation is marked by significant challenges. These include unequal access to educational opportunities, institutional resistance to change, restrictive policies, and concerns about the long-term sustainability of internationalisation efforts. However, he regards these challenges as potential opportunities and avenues for innovation, meaningful partnerships, and leadership that can help institutions overcome structural limitations and advance educational equity.

In the spirit of International Students' Day, the Director of CIE also eulogised the invaluable presence of international students at the University of Ilorin. He recognised their academic and cultural contributions as a vital part of the institution's global identity. £

- (iv) The Postgraduate academic session for Postgraduate programmes is 12 calendar months, commencing on 2nd October and ending on 30th September of the following year. The 12 calendar months start to count automatically from the date of first registration.
- (v) Applicants are to note that programmes automatically lapse at the expiration of the prescribed maximum duration for each programme. A candidate may, however, apply for an extension of not more than 12 months, in the first instance, subject to a maximum of two such extensions.

POSTGRADUATE PROGRAMMES OFFERED

1. Ph.D. Degree Programmes

These are available to holders of M.A.; M.Ed.; M.Eng.; M.Sc.; LL.M; and M.P.H degrees, with a minimum score of 60% or a minimum of 4 points on a 5 points Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) scale in their Master degree programmes. **A Ph.D. degree programme runs for a** minimum period of 36 calendar months and a maximum period of 60 calendar months for full-time candidates OR a minimum period of 48 calendar months and a maximum period of 72 calendar months for part-time candidates. Relevant Courses will be taken for the Ph.D. studies where prescribed, and a Thesis is required at the end of the Ph.D. programme.

2. M.Phil./Ph.D. Degree Programmes Candidates who scored between 55.00 and 59.99 percent or 3.50 – 3.99 CGPA score on a 5point scale can apply for admission into the Master of Philosophy (M.Phil./Ph.D.) degree programme. The M.Phil./Ph.D. degree programme is available only to full-time candidates. It runs for a minimum period of 12 calendar months and a maximum period of 24 calendar months, and a **Dissertation** is produced after the research work. Candidates in this category are eligible for conversion to Ph.D. programme, following a progress assessment report to be made by a Panel of Examiners at the end of the first session of registration. To be eligible for conversion to the Ph.D. program, candidates are expected to score not less than 60% (aggregate) at the end of the first session.

3. M.Phil. Degree Programmes

Candidates who scored between 50.00 and 54.99 percent or 3.00 - 3.49 CGPA score on a 5-point scale, can apply for admission into the Master of Philosophy (M.Phil.) degree programme. The M.Phil. degree programme is available only to full-time candidates. It runs for a minimum period of 18 calendar months and a maximum period of 24 calendar months on a full-time basis, and a **Dissertation** is produced after the research work.

4. Master Degree Programmes

M.A.; M.Ed.; M.Eng.; M.Sc.; LL.M and M.P.H. degrees run for a minimum period of 18 calendar months and a maximum period of 24 calendar months for full-time candidates OR a minimum period of 36 calendar months and a maximum period of 48 calendar months for part-time candidates. All Master degree programmes are by course work. This is in addition to a research report at the end of which a **Dissertation** is produced.

5. Postgraduate Diploma Degree Programmes Postgraduate Diploma degrees are available

Postgraduate Diploma degrees are available to candidates with Third Class (honours) degrees.

ELIGIBILITY FOR ACADEMIC PROGRAMMES

General Requirements:

- i. All entry certificate requirements shall be available at the point of purchasing the application form. *The National Youth Service Corp Discharge Certificate* OR *Exemption Certificate* should be dated and presented on or before September 30th, 2025.
- ii. Applicants are expected to submit their application forms online, together with scanned copies of their credentials.
- iii. After the submission of the application forms online, as stated in (ii) above, all supporting documents in (i) above and the hard copy of the application form should be forwarded to the Secretary, Postgraduate School, University of Ilorin, Ilorin, Nigeria between Monday, 2nd June 2025 and Friday, 6th June 2025, while the submission of Transcripts of Academic Records should be addressed and forwarded to the Head of Department where the admission is being sought. The Postgraduate School will not be held liable for any misdirected transcript.
- iv. All applicants must have 5 O/L Credit passes in the relevant subjects, which must include English Language and Mathematics. In line with Senate directives, applicants who had their O/L results before the year 2015 may have a pass in English or Mathematics depending on the programme applied for.
- Applicants for the Master degree programmes who V. are graduates of the University of Ilorin and other recognized universities must have a minimum of Second Class Honours Degree (Lower Division) and must be applying for programmes in which they had their first degrees. However, applicants with Second Class Honours Degree (Lower Division) and those with higher classes of degrees seeking admissions into programmes outside those in which they had their first degrees may be admitted, provided they satisfy the University of Ilorin Senate's requirements in a qualifying examination to be conducted. The least class of first Degree for all academic programme applicants is Second Class Honours Degree (Lower Division). The Bachelor degrees should be obtained from the University of Ilorin or any other university recognised by the Senate of the University of Ilorin. ALL applicants shall apply early for their official Bachelor degree transcript to be sent to the Head of Department where the admission is being sought, before the expiration of the stated deadline in B (iii) above. Again, the Postgraduate School will not be held liable or responsible for any misdirected transcript.
- vi. Applicants for the Ph.D. degree programme shall have obtained a relevant Master degree of the University of Ilorin or from other recognized Universities, with an average weighted score of at least 60% or a 4.0 points CGPA on a 5-point scale. Short-listed applicants would be required to satisfy the Postgraduate School in the qualifying interviews and assessments by the relevant Department. Applicants are, therefore, expected to interact with the department to which they have applied to ascertain the interview date for the Ph.D. degree programme. Regardless of the institution where the Master degree was obtained, all candidates must apply early for the official copy of their academic transcripts to be sent to the

Head of Department where the admission is being sought for the purpose of this admission and before the expiration of the stated deadline. Applicants must note that the Postgraduate School will not be responsible for any misdirected transcript.

- vii. All Higher Degree applicants that attended foreign Universities, where English language is not the medium of instruction, should submit to the Head of Department where the admission is being sought, evidence of their English Language proficiency, e.g. TOEFL or IELTS scores obtained within the validity period of such certifications.
- viii. Applicants for the Postgraduate Diploma and Master Degree Programmes will be subjected to a qualifying examination, irrespective of the class of degree obtained. However, applicants from the University of Ilorin with a First Class or a Second Class, Upper Division (Honours), provided such applicant is not applying to a department that is different from the one in which he/she graduated from at the undergraduate level, will be exempted from the qualifying examination.
- ix. International applicants (who are domiciled outside Nigeria and non-Nigerians applying from outside the country) shall be exempted from the qualifying examination irrespective of the class of degree. All applicants are requested to submit a proposal of not more than 5 pages, giving details of their intended areas of research interests. 

Remarkably too, in the 2024 maiden edition of the National Spokespersons Summit (NSS), the University's Director of Corporate Affairs, Kunle Akogun, emerged the first runner-up in the Corporate Governance category of the NIPR Award, bagging a prized Certificate of Excellence in Public Relations.

Earlier on Sunday, April 13th, 2025, the Vice Chancellor's Mida's touch and inimitable inspirational leadership had materialised when a 400-Level Mathematics student of the University, Kazeem Sanusi, set a new Guinness World Record for the 'Longest Mathematics Lesson.' Kazeem achieved the feat with a marathon lecture spanning 31 hours, 42 minutes and 54 seconds non-stop teaching at the University's Auditorium Basement. This groundbreaking feat surpassed the current record of 26 hours by over five hours.

With the expected official confirmation of Kazeem's new record by the London, UK-based Guinness World Records Limited (GWR), whose representatives were on ground to monitor the proceedings of the Unilorite's breath-taking teaching, the record breaker is surely on his way to global fame. And with this, he would have succeeded in placing the University of Ilorin once again on the global map of universities where the otherwise unthinkable feats are achieved! Expressing happiness over the achievement, the Mathematics prodigy said that he was motivated to take on the challenge by a personal desire to contribute meaningfully to Mathematics education by making it more visible and celebrated.

We recall that early last year, another Unilorite, Owoyemi Qudus Adebayo, also achieved an otherwise unimaginable feat by completing five skin fade haircuts in an amazing record time of 14 minutes, 56 seconds. With that, he broke the previous fastest skin fade haircuts record of 18 minutes, 57 seconds set by Enrico Springfield from South Africa.

TOWN & GOWN notices a curious correlation between these two Unilorite World Record setters. They are both into the studies of numbers: while Kazeem is rounding up in the Department of Mathematics, Qudus, who was also in 400 Level in 2023 when he achieved his feat, graduated from the Department of Statistics. There seems to be more in the study of numbers than meets the uninitiated eyes!

Other recorded feats in the less than three years of Prof. Egbewole's purposeful vice-chancellorship include conferment of 'The Most Outstanding University Award' on UNILORIN by The New Telegraph newspaper in 2024; sustenance of the University's winning streak of over 11 years back-to-back as the nation's preferred choice of admission seekers for which it recently won the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board's (JAMB) National Tertiary Admissions Performance Merit Award (NATAP-M) with a prize money of N500 million; a harvest of national and international honours and awards won in quick succession by UNILORIN lecturers and students; sterling performances by some of the University's Faculties in global academic performance rating; rating of the University as the 3rd Best university in Nigeria based on the quality and quantity of scholarly outputs of its academic staff members for three straight years on Elsevier/Scopus - SciVal; ranking of four of the University's Faculties and 11 of the courses offered at the institution among the world's best by the Times Higher Education (THE) in 2023; rating of the University as the 9th Best Value University among the 149 universities in Nigeria; rating of the University among the top 21% Best Value Universities globally; development of drought-tolerant and striga-resistant hybrid maize by a team of the University's researchers; successful hosting of the 3rd Summit of the D-8 Network of Pioneers for Research and Innovation (D-8 NPRI) in an unmistakable manifestation of the steady progress in the University's internationalisation drive; establishment of two new Centres, especially the Centre for Blue and Regenerative Economy, the Centre for Cultural Studies and Creative Arts; and the Centre for Gender Studies -- in line with the University's community service mandate; signing of more than 100 Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) with various universities across the globe; launch of the U-INSPIRE initiative to expand the skills acquisition programme for undergraduate students; conferment of the prestigious NIPR Fellowship on the Vice Chancellor in recognition of his immense contributions to the advancement of Public Relations practice through his exemplary management style.

So, with the whiff of the University's golden jubilee already in the air, all these monumental achievements recorded in the run-up to the anniversary will definitely add pep to the celebration and surely make it a worthy merriment.
