UNILORIN secures 100% NUC accreditation

7ith 36 of the 37 courses it presented for the National Universities Commission (NUC) accreditation exercise getting full accreditation and the remaining one getting interim accreditation, the University of Ilorin has again reaffirmed its better-by-far reputation.

The result of the accreditation exercise carried out in October/November 2024, which has just been released, was contained in a letter dated April 30, 2025 and addressed to the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, by the Executive Secretary of the Commission, Prof. Abdullahi Yusufu Ribadu. Amuda-Yusuf seeks collaboration in construction industry for building cost reduction

he Dean of the Faculty of Environmental Sciences, - University of Ilorin, Prof. Ganiyu Amuda-Yusuf, has stressed the need for effective collaboration among professionals in the nation's construction industry to ensure a better and all-inclusive costs

management.

Prof. Amuda-Yusuf made this call last Thursday (May 15, 2025) while delivering the 281st Inaugural Lecture of the University, titled "Value Proposition for Enhancing Cost Management of Subservient and Neglected Elements in Building" at the University Auditorium.

Egbewole inaugurates STIP Champions ...sets vision for innovation, industry collaboration

he Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, has inaugurated the Science, Technology and Innovation Park (STIP) Champions, charging the team to establish a hub that would drive innovation, research, and collaboration with industry partners.

The STIP Champions include Prof. Tanimola Makanjuola Akande, the Director of Unilorin Mentorship Centre; Dr. Bilqis Lawal of the Department of Pharmacology and Drug Development, Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences; Dr. Suleiman Abimbola Yahaya, Department of Biomedical Engineering, Faculty of Engineering; Dr Ibrahim Kehinde Olojoku, Department of Geology and Mineral Sciences, Faculty of Physical Sciences

Others are Dr Jumoke Oladele, Department of Social Science Education, Faculty of Education; and Dr Oluwatosin Igbayiloye, Department of Jurisprudence and International Law, Faculty of Law.

While inaugurating the committee last Monday (May 12, 2025), Prof. Egbewole stated that the project is a top priority for the University Administration and urged them to invest their time and energy into actualising the vision.

The Vice Chancellor acknowledged the financial constraints faced by the University but stressed that powerful ideas have the potential to attract funding and support. He painted a compelling picture of what success could look like, saying, "We may not have money, but if we have a good idea, money will come from it."

Prof. Egbewole further told the Committee members that "this is the idea I am presenting to you and want you to develop. For instance, if we are able to bring someone like Dangote to this campus to establish his company here, you can imagine what that would mean for us.'

The Vice Chancellor, who stressed that he expected a high level of commitment from the STIP Champions, announced that the team would be required to submit quarterly progress reports to enable the University to monitor the project's implementation and address challenges as they arise. He underlined the importance of time management and dedication, urging members to treat every second as vital to the success of the initiative.

While also encouraging the team to develop strategies for engagement and collaboration that would not compromise their existing responsibilities within the University, the Vice Chancellor said, "We know this may take you away from your routine duties, but if this project succeeds, your names will be written in gold. You will be remembered as pioneers of a new era of development for this University".

He further noted the need to study existing science and technology parks across the world to learn from their models. "We want to know how they got to where they are and see how we can adapt their strategies to our context," he said, hinting that physical visits to some of these parks may be necessary for a deeper understanding.

Speaking during the inauguration, the initiator of the Science, Technology, and Innovation Park (STIP) concept who is a renowned academic from the School of Mechanical and Industrial Engineering, Addis Ababa Institute of Technology, Addis Ababa University, Prof. Daniel Kitaw, expressed strong optimism for the project, describing it as a vital step towards advancing innovation in Nigeria and across Africa.

Prof. Kitaw, who joined virtually, congratulated members of the STIP Implementation Committee on being selected for what he described as "a critically important task to drive technological and industrial transformation on the African continent.'

He noted that the Committee members are privileged to have the support and leadership of a forwardthinking Vice Chancellor, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, whose commitment to innovation has made the project possible.

While praising the intellectual vibrancy and readiness of the selected scholars to engage in rigorous research, learning, and collaboration, Prof. Kitaw stated that the team would need to conduct in-depth studies that reflect the unique socio-economic and institutional context of the University of Ilorin, Kwara State, Nigeria, and Africa at large.

According to him, "these studies would form the knowledge foundation for the development and sustainability of the STIP initiative.

Speaking on a key starting point for the project, the visiting Professor said that the team would need to create awareness about the relevance and value of science and innovation parks, adding that there is need for a unified effort among stakeholders to promote a broader understanding of the project's objectives and potential impact.

While acknowledging the crucial role of institutional leadership in driving innovation and confirming that the University of Ilorin's top management has demonstrated exceptional commitment to the success of the initiative, the team lead expressed gratitude to the Vice Chancellor and the University Management team for embracing the vision and providing a platform for its realisation.

Pledging his full support, Prof. Kitaw assured the Committee of his personal involvement and the use of all resources at his disposal to help bring the vision to life. Despite the project being in its early stages, he expressed confidence in its potential, stating that he could already see promising signs of future success.

In his remarks, the Director of the Mentorship Centre, Prof. Tanimola Akande, thanked the Vice Chancellor, for involving him in what he described as "a significant academic and developmental journey."

UNILORIN secures 100% NUC accreditation

In the letter, signed on behalf of Prof. Ribadu by the NUC's Ag. Director of Accreditation, Engr Abraham Chundusu, the Commission explained that while 36 courses were granted full accreditation status, only one, Hausa, was granted interim accreditation. No course was denied accreditation.

From the Faculty of Management Sciences, Finance, which was presented, was granted full accreditation. From the Faculty of Basic Medical Science, Anatomy, which was the only programme presented, attracted full accreditation just like Computer Science in the Faculty of Communication and Information

From the Faculty of Education, all the 17 academic programmes presented were granted full accreditation while from the Faculty of Engineering and Technology, Chemical Engineering and Mechanical

Engineering, were fully accredited.

While each of the programmes presented in the Faculties of Environmental Sciences, Clinical Sciences and Pharmaceutical Sciences, was given full accreditation, three and four programmes were respectively granted full accreditation in the faculties of Physical Sciences and Social Science.

The Commission said that of the two courses, Igbo and Hausa, that were presented for accreditation from the Faculty of Arts, the former was granted full accreditation while the latter was granted interim accreditation.

Reacting to the development, the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Egbewole, said that the management, staff and students of the University received the news with excitement and a sense of fulfillment.

In a statement issued on his behalf by the University's Spokesperson, Mr Kunle Akogun, the

Vice Chancellor said, "We are happy to be so recognised, we are indeed elated.'

He said that the achievement was a confirmation of the consistent huge investment of the University Administration in human and material resources.

Pointing out that more efforts would be made to justify the recognition, Prof. Egbewole thanked the Provost, the Deans, the Heads of Departments and all the Faculty members "that have made this possible."

The Vice Chancellor said, "It is our hope that we would continue to do our best to position the University for more recognitions", adding that "we want to assure everybody that the Administration will continue to appreciate everybody."

Reacting to the televised apology tendered to the affected candidates by the JAMB Registrar last Wednesday (May 14, 2025), the UNILORIN Vice Chancellor, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, said, "Only a conscientious, sincere, and courageous leader with genuine compassion for the welfare of the people he serves could openly take responsibility for an incident surrounding the service delivery of an organisation he heads but which glitch was not due to his personal negligence."

In a statement issued on his behalf by the University's Director of Corporate Affairs, Mr Kunle Akogun, last Thursday (May 15, 2025), Prof. Egbewole said that the disposition of the JAMB Registrar has clearly shown him as a leader who is conscious of the fact that the buck stops on his desk, pointing out that "given the same circumstance, many Nigerian leaders would have regaled the public with untenable excuses to wash their hands clean of what had happened."

The Vice Chancellor said that he was moved beyond words with the remarkable manner Prof. Emeritus Oloyede addressed the matter, saying that only a true leader would do what the JAMB Registrar did and at the time he

According to Prof. Egbewole, "It is not every leader that owns up to mistakes and even takes responsibility for the infraction of others."

Prof. Egbewole, however, said that he was not surprised with the candour displayed by the Emeritus Professor of Islamic Jurisprudence, noting that as a total product of the University of Ilorin, Oloyede had been imbued with the right leadership values right from his undergraduate days and through his remarkable tenure as a staff member and culminating in his services to the University as its 8th Vice Chancellor from 2007 to 2012.

Commending the forthrightness of the JAMB Registrar, Prof. Egbewole said that the University of Ilorin is very proud of this distinguished alumnus who has always been one of his most valued ambassadors living up to the ideals of the University as a bastion of excellence, probity, and high impact service delivery.

UNILORIN, NGSA to collaborate on staff, students'internship

he Nigerian Geological Survey Agency (NGSA) and the University of Ilorin have agreed to establish a development-collaboration that will entail a short term work and learning experience for the academic staff of the University on one hand, and the technical staff of the Agency on the other hand.

The internship programme, according to the organisations, will serve as a platform for the acquisition of professional learning experience for beneficiaries toward the realisation of the set goal of economic diversification and advancement of mining and geosciences in the country.

The agreement was the highlight of the visit of the UNILORIN Vice Chancellor, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, to the NGSA Director-General Prof. Olusegun Omoniyi Ige, in his office in Abuja last Tuesday (May 13, 2025).

Prof. Egbewole said that internship is one of the ways by which the University of Ilorin desires to collaborate with NGSA toward the realisation of the mandates of both organisations. He explained that as expected, the University is mandated to embark on research and the dissemination of knowledge, while NGSA will explore the country to provide geosciences data on minerals, with the aim of creating wealth while diversifying and developing the economy.

The Vice Chancellor said, "In the University, we pride ourselves with research and teaching, while NGSA is exploring to create wealth for sustainable development. We want to work with NGSA. We are happy that some of our students are on internship here at the NGSA, we want more of it.

"We want more in terms of internships for lecturers and professors while NGSA staff will also visit the University for a programme or the other."

Prof. Egbewole, who visited the Agency in the company of Dr Marouf Abdul Adekunle and Mr Salaudeen

Abdulrahaman, said, "I am here to formally congratulate and visit our own Prof. Olusegun Ige on his appointment as Director General of the NGSA," adding that the University of Ilorin is proud of him while the "NGSA is extremely lucky" to have him as its helmsman.

Until his appointment as Director-General of the NGSA, Prof. Ige was the Head of the Department of Geology and Mineral Sciences at the University of Ilorin.

The Vice Chancellor, who described Ige as an illustrious product of the University, said that the relationship between NGSA and the University will continue to blossom.

"We have been planning to pay him a visit and we are happy it is happening today," Prof. Egbewole said, adding that he wished the visit had come earlier.

Declaring goodwill and support for the Director-General, Prof. Egbewole said, "As a University, we appreciate his personality as an individual. He has our support. The University of Ilorin and NGSA will collaborate in a way that will enhance what we are doing."

While saying that the Agency has a crucial role to play in the realisation of the set goal of developing the minerals sector for national economic diversification, the Vice

Chancellor expressed optimism that the University and the Agency will spell out terms of the partnership. He said, "After this meeting, we look forward to an MoU between the University of Ilorin and NGSA."

Welcoming the UNILORIN team earlier, the Director-General of NGSA assured the Vice Chancellor of the determination of President Bola Tinubu and the Minister of Solid Minerals Development, Mr Dele Alake, to transform the economy by developing the minerals sector.

Prof. Ige said that the NGSA as an agency of the Ministry of Solid Minerals Development, "focuses on mineral exploration in a scientific manner," adding that it generates the geosciences data needed for investment in the mineral sector that will "enhance national economic development."

While disclosing that the NGSA is over 100 years old, the Director-General pointed out that it has 27 offices across the country.

"We have six Zonal Offices across the nation and over 400 staff," he stated.

Amuda-Yusuf canvasses collaboration in construction industry for better cost management

The Dean, who is a two-terms Head of the Department of Quantity Surveying, said that with increasing collaborations among professionals in the construction industry the cost of building would be relatively brought down.

He also called for a purposeful integration of knowledge among construction professionals, saying that this would enhance a more robust project planning and delivery.

Prof. Amuda-Yusuf, whose Inaugural Lecture was the first to be delivered from the Faculty of Environmental Sciences, also explained that 'buildings must be designed with essential features that deliver the expected comfort level to occupants and meet environmental standards.

These features, according to the Inaugural Lecturer, include a balance of space temperature, lighting, humidity levels, efficient communication capabilities, convenient power supply, high quality sanitation and reliable system installations to protect both occupants and property.

He also canvassed a situation where the construction industry would embrace environmental consciousness through the adoption of green materials, optimising energy and water usage as well as effective waste management.

Prof. Amuda-Yusuf, who is also serving as the Dean of the Faculty for the second time, equally called for the establishment of a robust regulatory framework for the construction industry. This, he said, would bring development in the industry under more effective control and management.

He equally called for a greater investment in training and capacity building for the nation's construction industry to become more dependable and reliable.

According to the don, "there is lack of evidence indicating that Quantity Surveyors (QS) are effectively demonstrating leadership in the cost management of building services." He,

therefore, charged Quantity Surveyors to swiftly take the lead for their impacts to be felt.

Prof. Amuda-Yusuf, who called for the adoption of standardised measurement methods, encouraged collaboration between Quantity Surveyors and Service Engineers from the project inception to enable them acquire a deeper knowledge and comprehensive understanding of the technology involved.

He also made a case for the integration of Building Information Modeling (BMS) in measurement standards. He said, "Project management practitioners should move beyond viewing BIM merely as a software tool and embrace it as a collaboration and information management framework."

Prof. Amuda-Yusuf, who is a former Chairman of the Nigerian Institute of Quantity Surveyors, Kwara State chapter, also called for the adoption of standard-based pricing mechanisms and integration of value engineering into

project planning.

While calling for the promotion of education and training in sustainable construction practices, Prof. Amuda-Yusuf suggested that policy makers within the industry should develop and enforce national standards in project execution.

Citing his experience as an example, Prof. Amuda-Yusuf enjoined institutions of higher learning in the country to make use of qualified and experienced building professionals in their services in carrying out construction works on their campuses as he said that whatever they make from the projects would be ploughed back to such institutions in terms of knowledge and facilities.

The lecture, which was presided over by the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, was attended by colleagues, friends, relations and students of Prof. Amuda-Yusuf from far and near.

UNILORIN don warns against proliferation of boreholes

Prof. Saminu Olatunji of the Department of Geophysics, University of Ilorin, has raised concerns over the increasing number of boreholes in residential communities, warning that the trend poses significant environmental and public health risks.

Speaking during an interview with the *UNILORIN Bulletin*, Prof. Olatunji said that the indiscriminate drilling of boreholes, often without professional assessment, threatens the sustainability of groundwater resources.

He said, "While boreholes have become a quick fix for water scarcity, the uncontrolled digging of multiple boreholes in close proximity leads to the rapid depletion of aquifers", adding that "this can result in drying up of wells, land subsidence, and deterioration of water quality due to contamination."

The don noted that the absence of a central water management system in many urban and semi-urban areas has

pushed individuals and institutions to sink private boreholes, often in violation of environmental regulations.

According to him, "Without coordinated groundwater monitoring and regulation, we are risking long-term consequences, including water shortages, conflicts over water access and irreversible damage to the ecosystem."

To address the growing challenge, Prof. Olatunji recommended the establishment of a community-based water management policy that includes regulation of borehole drilling, implementation and enforcement of laws that require environmental impact assessments before any drilling activity.

He added that centralised water systems by the governments and community leaders through investing in centralised and well-maintained public water supply systems will reduce reliance on private boreholes.

Prof. Olatunji advised that sensitisation programmes should be launched to educate residents on the environmental implications of excessive borehole usage.

He urged policy makers, environmental agencies, and community leaders to act swiftly to prevent a looming water crisis, noting that "water is life, but if we mismanage its source, we risk endangering both our health and our future."

2 UNILORIN students win maiden NIAE quiz competition

The Dean said that the Faculty, which was one of the founding Faculties and the largest Faculty in the University, has every reason to play a frontline role in the celebration.

Spike in male infertility rate Expert warns against delayed marriage

renowned gynaecologist at the Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Faculty of Clinical Sciences, University of Ilorin, Prof. Abiodun Akanbi Gafar Jimoh, has raised serious concerns over the increasing rates of male infertility in Nigeria, advising young men against postponing marriage until they acquire wealth.

Speaking while delivering the 17th Faculty Lecture of the Faculty of Clinical Sciences last Wednesday (May 14, 2025), themed "The Male Factor in Infertility: A Global Scourge — The Underestimated and Unmitigated Catastrophe of Our Time", the seasoned gynaecologist noted that age-related decline in male fertility is becoming a public health concern.

Prof. Jimoh warned that clinical experience and current research have confirmed a global rise in male infertility, with Nigeria recording alarming trends. He stressed that male infertility is worsening day by day, and advised that fertility should be considered a shared responsibility between partners in a relationship.

While pointing out that a man's previous ability to father children does not necessarily mean he remains fertile, particularly if issues arise in subsequent relationships, the Gynaecologic-Endocrinologist urged men to undergo medical evaluation whenever infertility is suspected, rather than assuming the problem lies with the woman.

Commenting on suspected infertility in a polygamous setting, the expert cautioned that it is incorrect to presume that the younger wife is at fault for not conceiving if the older wives have borne children. In such cases, he recommended that both partners undergo clinical assessment by a qualified gynaecologist for accurate diagnosis and guidance.

Prof. Jimoh expressed concern over the increasing cases of erectile dysfunction being diagnosed in men as young as 25 years old. He identified this condition as a critical contributor to male infertility and lamented that many men avoid seeking medical or psychological help due to societal expectations and the misconception that infertility is exclusively a female problem.

According to the healthcare practitioner, Nigeria ranks among the countries with the highest male infertility rates globally. He attributed the trend to a combination of poverty, alcohol consumption, cigarette smoking, and environmental factors.

While reporting findings from a recent study conducted in Ilorin, Prof.



Jimoh noted that male-factor infertility at the University of Ilorin Teaching Hospital (UITH) and affiliated clinics is characterised by severe abnormalities in sperm production, oxidative stress, and hormonal imbalances.

He added that the study, which reviewed 456 men who attended the hospital's STD/infertility clinic, found that 23.7% had no sperm in their semen, while 45.3% had low sperm count. Among the cases studied, 34.8% involved primary infertility, with the remaining 65.2% classified as secondary infertility, occurring after at least one prior conception.

In a chat with *UNILORIN Bulletin* on the sideline of the event, the Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, who was represented by the Deputy Vice Chancellor (Academic), Prof. Moji Taibat Bakare-Odunola, commended the Faculty of Clinical Sciences on its consistency in sustaining the Faculty Lecture Series over the years.

He acknowledged the value of such academic traditions in fostering intellectual discourse, advancing medical knowledge, and contributing to national development through evidence-based dialogue.

While commenting on the importance of the theme of the 17th Faculty Lecture, the Vice Chancellor described the topic as timely and profoundly relevant, especially in light of emerging global health data indicating a steady rise in male infertility across diverse populations.

Prof. Egbewole noted that the lecture theme serves as a wake-up call to both the academic and public health communities, urging a shift in attention to an often-overlooked dimension of reproductive health.

According to him, the traditional emphasis on female infertility has overshadowed the equally significant contributions of male factors, leading to an incomplete understanding of the issue and ineffective interventions. He warned that continued neglect of male infertility not only perpetuates stigma and misinformation but also poses long-term demographic and psychological consequences.

The Vice Chancellor, however, reaffirmed the commitment of the University to supporting research, public health advocacy, and community engagement on critical issues affecting the health and well-being of Nigerians. He encouraged scholars and health professionals to continue exploring underreported areas like male infertility in order to drive policy change and improve healthcare outcomes.

In his opening remarks, the Dean of the Faculty, Prof. Lukman Abdur-Rahman, noted that the Faculty lecture tradition continues to serve as a platform for intellectual exchange, academic excellence, and community impact.

He noted that "while we were unable to maintain the conventional quarterly schedule due to prevailing economic and academic constraints, we deliberately decided to integrate other valuable programmes that enrich our academic pursuits and reinforce our relevance in the larger society."

Prof. Lukman added that "individuals should take opportunities provided by Faculty Lectures and other invited talks to interrogate our academic prowess, scientific inquisitiveness and clinical judgments to propel innovative initiatives that will propel frontiers in our sojourn to fame."

The Dean noted that "it is through such intellectual engagements that we advance the frontiers of research and strengthen our collective contributions to healthcare."

The Director General assured that the Agency will continue to deploy relevant scientific strategies to achieve its mandates, stating that it applies different tools acquired by its technical staff while they were students at various universities. He said the strategies include professional application of geophysics, economic geology, regional geology and other aspects of the geosciences.

He commended the Vice Chancellor for ensuring qualitative dissemination of knowledge at the University of Ilorin, adding that NGSA has over 20 staff who are products of the University.

UNILORIN produces first female Ph.D holder in Petroleum Geology

he nation's most sought-after University, the University of Ilorin, has recorded another feat with the graduation of Dr Serah Japhet Habu as the first female doctorate degree holder in Petroleum Engineering from Northern Nigeria, which consists of 19 states and the Federal Capital territory.

Dr Habu, who completed her doctorate programme in October, 2024 at the Department of Geology and Mineral Sciences, was supervised by the immediate past Head of the Department Prof. Olabisi Adeleye Adekeye.

Her work, which centred on energy geoscience, petroleum exploration, and remote sensing, has made her an emerging leader in her field.

This distinguished scientist, who was born on June 10, 1984 in Gombe State, developed a passion for science early in life. She obtained a National Diploma in Science Laboratory Technology at the University of Jos in 2006 and subsequently earned a B.Sc. in Chemical Petroleum Technology in 2011 from the same University.

Dr Habu advanced her education to M. Sc. degree in Stratigraphy and Sedimentology at the Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria in 2018 in the course of which she conducted a penetrating research on the stratigraphy and structures of Aptian-Albian succession around Kaltungo Inlier in the

Upper Benue Trough, Nigeria.

Her experience laid the foundation for her doctorate programme at the University of Ilorin during which she developed an innovative GIS-based hydrocarbon prospectivity mapping method for the Bida Basin, Central Nigeria as ably supervised by Prof. Adekeye.

Dr Habu's doctoral research, which was published in the Arabian Journal of Geosciences, was one of Nigeria's first comprehensive GIS-based hydrocarbon studies in the in-land basins as it offers critical insights into future hydrocarbon exploration and energy

development.

Dr Habu is currently a Research Geoscientist at the National Centre for Remote Sensing (NSRS) Jos, Plateau State, under the National Space Research and Development Agency (NASRDA).

She applied satellite image processing and spatial analysis to geological and environmental projects such as geothermal resource assessments, hydrocarbon exploration, and coal deposit mapping.

Dr Habu's expertise has earned her several prestigious awards, such as the 2023 NMGS President's Young Geoscientist Miner's Award and the 2024 NMGS President's Award.

Meanwhile, the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, has congratulated Dr Habu on her achievement.

In a statement, the University's Spokesperson, Mr Kunle Akogun, said that Dr Habu's journey exemplifies resilience, innovation, and leadership, which position her as a key figure in shaping the future of geoscience practices in Nigeria.

While congratulating the Department of Geology and Mineral Sciences for its efficient service delivery, the Vice Chancellor assured everyone that the University is prepared to turnout more outstanding graduates as it possesses both the human and material resources to do so.

he Sub-Dean of the Faculty of Communication and Information Sciences (CIS), University of Ilorin, Dr Amos Bajeh, has called on students to leverage technology as a tool for addressing societal issues.

Dr Bajeh gave the advice last Tuesday (May 13, 2025), while speaking at the maiden edition of the NACOSS TechFest 1.0, themed "Tech for Good: Creating Solutions for a Better World", organised by the Nigeria Association of Computer Science Students (NACOSS), UNILORIN Chapter, in collaboration with the National Association of Computer Science Students (NACOS).

The Sub-Dean emphasised the need for technology to be used for social good, particularly in solving grassroots problems.

According to Dr Bajeh, the relevance of technology is defined by its ability to address real world challenges, citing innovations such as mMitra, EDVES, Kuda, and the use of Artificial Intelligence in agriculture in India as examples of tech solutions that have transformed lives.

technology as a life changing force.



Law Faculty wins national moot court contest on disability rights

he Faculty of Law, University of Ilorin, has emerged victorious in the maiden edition of the Wahab Egbewole SAN National Disability Rights Moot Court Competition. The University's team, comprising Mr. Ologunde Ajibola and Mr. Opoola Opeyemi, both 500-level Common Law students, clinched the coveted trophy after a keenly contested final round.

The competition, which drew participants from several Law Faculties across the country, culminated in a gripping semi-final and final phases, where only four universities advanced. At the final round which was held last Thursday (May 15, 2025), at the Moot Court of the Faculty of Law, University of Ilorin, the host institution slugged it out with Lead City University (LCU), Ibadan, and emerged champions. Lead City University took second position, while the University of Nigeria (UNN), Nsukka, came third.

In his remarks, before announcing the results, the chair of the judging panel, Hon. Justice M. O. Folorunsho of the Kwara State High Court, commended both the applicant (University of Ilorin) and the respondent (Lead City University) on their outstanding performance throughout the competition. He praised the depth of their legal reasoning, clarity of presentation, and eloquence.

While saying that some lawyers who have been called to the Bar would struggle to match what these students have done, Justice Folorunsho said that their arguments were perfectly researched and impeccably presented, adding that the arguments canvassed by the parties were excellent and their presentations, command of language, knowledge of the law, and application of the law to facts were top-notch.

In a goodwill message, the Vice Chancellor of the University of

Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, appreciated all the universities that participated in both the preliminary and final rounds of the competition, noting that the success of the event was made possible by their involvement.

He revealed that he had initially resisted the idea of naming the moot competition after himself. "When the idea was first broached, I resisted it, mainly because it was going to be the 'Wahab Egbewole Moot Court'. Yes, it was focused on disability rights, but I felt it was important to clearly define our processes."

He said, "Time has a way of creating narratives, and if I were not the sitting Vice Chancellor, it might have been a different conversation. But the fact that I currently hold this office could have sent the wrong signals. That's why I initially resisted, until I could no longer stop it. But in the end, I am grateful to the organisers for bestowing me with this great honour".

While speaking on his long-standing commitment to disability rights, the Senior Advocate of Nigeria explained that the issue is close to his heart and perhaps one of the reasons why the organisers built the moot competition around the theme.

The Professor of Jurisprudence and International Law spoke on the universal nature of disability, however, said "My take is that we are all actually disabled in one way or another, and there is a very thin line between ability and disability. You can become disabled at any moment. For me, it is important to emphasize the need to take care of all of us, irrespective of our status in life."

He expressed deep appreciation to all the sponsors of the competition and expressed the hope that the powerful legal arguments and perspectives presented during the moot court sessions would resonate beyond the courtroom, influencing broader conversations and policies on disability rights.

Prof. Egbewole also acknowledged the ECOWAS Court of Justice for its support and for sending a representative to serve on the panel of judges, describing their involvement as a meaningful validation of the competition's importance.

Also speaking at the grand finale, a panelist and representative of the ECOWAS Court of Justice, Mr. Oludayo Fagbemi, expressed strong admiration for the outstanding performance of the participating students. He described the standard of advocacy demonstrated during the competition as highly impressive and a positive sign for the future of legal practice within the ECOWAS region.

In a chat with *UNILORIN Bulletin*, the Dean of the Faculty of Law, Prof. Nimah Modupe Abdulraheem, explained the importance of providing students with practical legal experience, noting that the Wahab Egbewole SAN National Disability Rights Moot Court Competition was designed not just as a simulation, but as a serious, professional training exercise.

Prof. Abdulraheem explained that the Faculty deliberately invited judges from the ECOWAS Court of Justice and other African jurisdictions to serve on the panel to ensure that the competition mirrored real-life courtroom proceedings. According to her, although it was a moot court event, the Faculty approached it with the seriousness and authenticity of actual legal practice.

In a goodwill message, the Chairman of the Egbewole-Banjo Foundation, Mallam Aliu Badmus, lauded the initiative as a powerful demonstration of the role of Law in advancing social justice and human dignity.

Represented by Dr. Barakat Adebisi Raji, a Senior Lecturer in the Department of Jurisprudence and International Law at the University of Ilorin, Dr Badmus described the event as more than just an academic exercise. He said it was a beacon of advocacy, knowledge, and inclusion of a transformative platform where future legal professionals are not only trained to argue the law but to engage with the realities of disability rights with compassion, courage, and intellectual rigour.

Appreciating Oloyede's exemplary leadership template

hat really do Nigerians want? Are we really serious about our oft-repeated yearning for an ideal leader comparable to those in 'saner climes', as professional critics often regale us with? Which particular leader can ever satisfy Nigerians: the abrasive? the candid? the sincere? the whimsical? the unabashedly corrupt? the audacious? Apparently and quite unfortunately, none of these! For, like the characters in Ebenezer Obey's classical song, 'The Man and the Horse', Nigerians are difficult, if not impossible to satisfy.

In one breath, we yearn for an ideal 'saner-clime' type of leader who is full of integrity and with the interest of the people at heart. In another breath, we scoff at any leader whose disposition is closer to that ideal construct of leadership trait just because he does not belong to our clan or creed. This scenario would appear to have played out last week when a Nigerian public official did the unthinkable by owning up to a fault he did not commit directly and sought forgiveness of Nigerians, especially those directly affected. That was the Oloyede story.

In a rare display of sincere leadership and genuine compassion for the welfare of the people he serves, the Registrar of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB), Emeritus Prof. Is'haq Olanrewaju Oloyede, CON, last Wednesday (May 14, 2025) publicly apologised for the glitches that marred the just concluded Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME).

Not only did he take full responsibility for the computer errors that led to failures in the examination in Lagos and some South Eastern states, he also offered a second chance to the affected candidates, about 379,997 of them, to retake the examination.

Whereas a typical Nigerian leader would blame everybody else but himself for any anomaly, Emeritus Prof. Oloyede, knowing full well that as a servant leader, the buck stops on his table, took responsibility for everything that went wrong. He said, "As Registrar of JAMB, I hold myself personally responsible, including for the negligence of the Service Provider, and I unreservedly apologise for it and the trauma that it has subjected affected Nigerians to, directly and indirectly." He wouldn't even blame the contractor (Service Provider) who had pocketed huge sums of money for the critical job he was supposed to have provided seamlessly!

This is quite unusual, but very laudable, especially in a country where leaders are fond of giving excuses to rationalise their failure to deliver on assigned mandates. Indeed, like the Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, said while reacting to the unusual openness displayed by Prof. Oloyede in the handling of the matter, "only a conscientious, sincere, and courageous leader with genuine compassion for the welfare of the people he serves could openly accept responsibility for an incident surrounding the service delivery of an organisation he heads but which glitch was not due to his personal negligence."

Expectedly, this unprecedented sincerity, by Nigerian leadership standard, was massively commended all over the country by prominent individuals, national and international

organisations, as a rarity in Nigeria's socio-political milieu.

This is not surprising, anyway, as the iconic Emeritus Professor has always proven to be a rare breed Nigerian. As I wrote in the introduction to my humble contribution to a Festschrift in honour of Prof. Oloyede on his retirement from the University of Ilorin in 2024, "he is a public official who is apparently immune to the general malaise bedevilling the nation's socio-economic milieu. His entire public service record radiates transparency, accountability, single-minded commitment to service excellence, administrative acumen, dogged commitment to the achievement of set goals, undiluted integrity in public service, effortless exhibition of leadership by example and unapologetic insistence on fairness to all!"

I added in that piece, titled 'OLOYEDE: Portrait of a Rare Breed Public Servant', "This audacious public servant became a household name nationwide during his tenure as the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, having largely succeeded in turning the second generation University to a world class institution. This, he achieved by dint of hard work, resilience, consistency, tenacity of purpose, innovative ideas, and unparalleled team spirit.

"As Registrar/Chief Executive of JAMB, Oloyede left no stone unturned in his relentless pursuit of academic excellence through which he ensured that admission into tertiary institutions in Nigeria is transparent and credible. Apart from ensuring and sustaining the unassailable integrity of the tertiary institutions' admission process, another remarkable feat of JAMB under Professor Oloyede's watch is the yearly remittance of huge funds, running into billions of naira, to the Federal Government's coffers. This is quite unprecedented by any non-revenue yielding MDA in the country. The money, according to the Board's spokesman, Dr. Fabian Benjamin, was saved through the transparent and judicious use of resources. This is indeed praise-worthy, especially in a country where even some MDAs that were specifically and statutorily established to collect revenue for the government often go back to the government to ask for extra-budgetary bail-outs to augment their overhead costs. Those who do not receive such bail-outs often remit pittance to the national treasury at the end of the financial year."

However, even though Prof. Oloyede's genuine acceptance of blame and sincere apology over the UTME saga drew massive applause from well-meaning Nigerians and non-Nigerians, the reactions of some professional critics and a coterie of unapologetic habitual haters of this new breed Nigerian public official have left a lot to be desired. One of these reactions was the rejection of JAMB's decision to conduct a fresh examination for candidates affected by the system error by a group that went ahead to make a laughable demand that rather than scheduling a 're-sit' of the UTME, JAMB should just "award 300 marks to all affected candidates from the South East"! What a demand! Why must we politicise everything in this country, including subjecting the future of our innocent children to the needless game of political mischief? The story of Miss Joy Mmesoma Ejikeme, who claimed to have been the highest scorer in the 2023 UTME, is still fresh in our memories. It was later discovered that the innocent damsel was being used as a pawn in a wicked political chessboard.
