Prof. Arokoyo gave this advice last Thursday (May 22, 2025) while delivering the 282nd Inaugural Lecture of the University, titled "From the Mouths of Babes to the Wisdom of Elders: A Voyage of Language Exploration", at the University Auditorium.

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VC urges police to intensify security in off-campus areas

he Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, has appealed to the Kwara State Command of the Nigeria Police to intensify surveillance and security efforts in the off-campus areas surrounding the University to ensure that students live in comfort, regardless of where they reside.

The Vice Chancellor made the appeal penultimate Friday (May 16, 2025), when he led Principal Officers and other officials of the University on a familiarisation visit to the newly deployed Commissioner of Police in Kwara State, Mr Adekimi Ojo, at the State Police Command headquarters.

Prof. Egbewole, who expressed concern over the persistent harassment and insecurity faced by the students living off campus, stressed the need for increased police presence in those areas to ensure the safety and well-being of students, thereby allowing them to focus on their academic pursuits without fear.

The Vice Chancellor noted that the welfare and security of students are of utmost importance to the University Administration, saying, "Our students are the reason we are employed as staff of this institution. No matter where they reside, their safety and comfort must be a top priority".

Prof. Egbewole also raised concerns about the activities of herdsmen around the University premises. He said despite several warnings and efforts by the University, the herders continue to encroach on the campus, posing risks to students and staff.

While urging the police to intervene and prevent the situation from escalating into a larger crisis, the Vice Chancellor lamented that despite repeated warnings, herders continue to harass students and staff and encroach on the campus.

Also speaking on the issue of vandalisation of cables within the campus, the Vice Chancellor called on the Police to apply stricter measures against vandals to deter future occurrences. He said, "Acts of vandalism should be met with stiffer penalties. This will serve as a deterrent to others. As a University, we maintain a zero-tolerance policy on cultism and other vices. However, we rely on the police to help secure areas beyond our internal capacity".

Prof. Egbewole congratulated the new Commissioner of Police on his promotion and deployment to Kwara State, assuring him of the University's continued cooperation with the police command. "We are pleased to be associated with the Nigeria Police Force. You have consistently responded to our requests and proven to be dependable partners in



maintaining peace and order. This visit by me and my team is a deliberate gesture to express our appreciation to the Command," he submitted.

While responding to the Vice Chancellor, the Kwara State Commissioner of Police, Mr Adekimi Ojo, commended the University of Ilorin on its unwavering commitment to discipline and zero tolerance for cultism, describing it as a key factor in the institution's uninterrupted academic calendar and peaceful atmosphere.

The Police Commissioner noted that the high level of discipline instilled in Unilorin students has contributed significantly to the ease of policing the University environment. He acknowledged that the fear of disciplinary consequences, including expulsion, has deterred students from engaging in criminal or anti-social behavior.

According to the Police boss, the stability of the University's academic calendar is a direct result of the institution's success in eradicating cult-related activities from its campus. He described this achievement as a remarkable virtue that distinguishes the University from many of its counterparts.

Mr Ojo, who mentioned the strong and cordial relationship between the police command and the university management, stated that, the University of Ilorin remains one of the most preferred institutions among admission seekers and parents across the country, largely because of its consistent and reliable academic calendar.

While addressing security concerns raised by the Vice Chancellor regarding the activities of herders, the Police Commissioner acknowledged that the problem extends beyond the University of Ilorin. However, he pledged that the Command would no longer treat the issue lightly. He noted that the police would begin to take decisive steps, including prosecuting cattle owners and herders who are found disturbing the peace within and around the University community.

He also responded to reports that incidents of cable vandalism on the University campus have reduced, expressing satisfaction with the progress made. Nonetheless, he said the Command would continue to go after those who remain undeterred by existing measures and ensure that such acts are met with the full weight of the law.

The Police Commissioner appreciated the visit by the University Management and reaffirmed the commitment of the Police Command to maintaining a secure and supportive environment for all educational institutions in the state. He described the visit as a gesture that would not be taken for granted and reiterated the readiness of the Police to continue working hand-in-hand with the University to promote peace and safety.

Also in his remarks, the Ag Dean of Student Affairs, Dr Alex Akanmu, who corroborated the Vice Chancellor's concerns, disclosed that the University is stepping up its efforts to combat drug abuse among students.

Dr Akanmu stated that the institution recognises the far-reaching consequences of drug abuse on students' academic performance, mental health, and overall well-being. In light of this, he said the University has launched several proactive initiatives aimed at curbing the menace.

According to the world renowned playwright, literary awards, including the Nobel Prize, often involve 80 percent of luck, as they are subject to the personal preferences and biases of judges.

He said, "They have their prejudices and fantasies, which they like to be presented to them. Ignore it, and one day you'll be surprised that while sitting down, eating your amala and ewedu, a call will come to say the prize is yours".

Sharing insights from his personal journey,

Prof. Soyinka reflected on his own surprise at receiving the Nobel Prize, noting that he initially did not believe the announcement. "There are institutes that are entitled to nominate future recipients. When I was teaching at Harvard, I came under that group because Harvard University was one of the authorised institutions. I certainly never believed that I would get a nomination, and when the prize came, I refused to believe it, as I thought it was another speculation by Nigerian enthusiasts".

Prof. Soyinka, who received the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1986, urged writers to treat rejections as part of the journey. He suggested that writers should keep writing, learn from their rejections, and use them as an opportunity to improve their work.

He also encouraged them to share their work with others, be patient with their ideas, and not be obsessed with prizes, noting that recognitions may come unexpectedly if they continue to write.

While answering a question on a broader cultural context and concern for the younger generation, Prof. Soyinka



described them as endangered due to overreliance on digital technology.

The Nobel Laureate observed that while the internet has facilitated significant political and social movements, like the Arab Spring, it also presents a challenge to African youths who often adopt the technology without fully understanding its impact.

He said, "They don't know it, but they are a seriously endangered generation. Look at what's coming out of Africa today in the artistic world. This continent is producing a new crop of writers and artists, especially women. The women emerging from Nigeria alone these days are among the best anywhere in the world. Nothing wins one's heart more than encountering this generation of young people, not just in the arts, but also in technology, mathematics. Look at those who are creating programmes for cybernetic applications, for commercial companies, and sometimes just on their own initiative. It's a mixed bag. Unfortunately, the greatest users of this new technology are the younger generations, who often think they're at the pinnacle of global knowledge and capability. Perhaps we're viewing them from our own distant perspective".

Reflecting on his deep relationship with language and how he acquired knowledge, the international scholar traced his fascination with words to childhood.

He said, "I am fascinated by languages. When I was studying for my degree, my curiosity led me to take one of my minor courses in linguistics itself. I was just fascinated by the ability of humans to change sounds in different languages. In school, I studied Latin at Government College, Ibadan. When I went to the University of Ibadan, then University College Ibadan, one of my subjects was Greek. I grew up with Yoruba, which is most important to me. I was excited by the paratechnique of novelist Daniel O. Fagunwa to the extent that I translated three of his Yoruba novels into English literature. I wanted to see if I could transmit the richness that I enjoyed in Fagunwa's books into another language.

Speaking further, he said, "And of course, I enjoy listening to elders telling stories and adorning the stories with songs. It's just something I can't explain, except for the fact that I love the sound of words from my childhood and the manipulation of words. For those of us who come from tonal languages like Yoruba, one syllable given different tonality can mean about five different things. It's like magic to me. I was just fortunate that I grew up within a culture that values languages, and that's why we must never abandon or diminish our indigenous languages in any way."

The Inaugural Lecturer, who is also a member of the Management Board of *UNILORIN 89.3 FM*, said that the advice is particularly important to preserve minority languages that are facing overwhelming threats from different angles.

Prof. Arokoyo said that it was high time governments, educational institutions, and language communities integrated indigenous and minority languages into formal and informal education systems to ensure their continued use and survival.

She explained that the implementation of her suggestion would support natural language acquisition and foster early literacy development in the child's dominant language(s).

Prof. Arokoyo, who received all her academic qualifications from the University of Ilorin, also called for the continuous expansion of language documentation and research.

She explained that universities, research institutions, government agencies, and international organisations should prioritise the documentation of endangered languages to preserve their grammatical structures, vocabulary, and cultural narratives, saying that this would be helped through making more funds available for the purpose.

Prof. Arokoyo also canvassed the promotion of language revitalisation through the exploration of technology and media.

She noted that governments, technology companies, and cultural organisations should leverage digital tools and media to revitalise and promote endangered languages to prevent them against the threat of extinction.

Prof. Arokoyo also appealed to governments and policymakers to recognise the linguistic rights of indigenous language speakers and enforce policies that would protect and promote language diversity.

The Inaugural Lecturer equally appealed to stakeholders to encourage interdisciplinary collaboration in linguistic research, saying that that would synchronise with unfolding expectations.

She said that linguists must also collaborate with professionals in technology, anthropology, education, and policy-making to enhance the effectiveness of language preservation and revitalisation efforts.

Prof. Arokoyo equally encouraged universities and other training institutions to incorporate business, digital marketing, and entrepreneurship courses into linguistics programmes to equip emerging linguists with the skills needed to start language-based businesses such as translation, language teaching, consulting, and AI development.

The don equally said that time was ripe for linguistics students to be exposed to industry experience through their participation in the Student Industrial Work Experience Scheme (SIWES), saying that the programme should also be extended to students of linguistics.

She also appealed to governments, institutions of learning, and organisations to ensure that the staff, facilities and equipment, library, and office space needed to train upcoming linguists are provided and periodically updated.

Drawing from personal experience, Prof. Arokoyo appealed to parents, guardians, teachers and other stakeholders not to lose hope in their children who might be struggling in their academic works.

She said that those learners neither deserve condemnation nor abandonment but encouragement and counseling for them

to discover themselves.

Prof. Arokoyo, whose masterful delivery drew repeated ovations from members of the audience, commended her teachers at all levels of her education for contributing their various quotas to making her what she has become.

The renowned linguist appealed to all those who are working in the nation's educational industry to deploy their talents to building others who would continue with their legacies.

Prof. Arokoyo specifically paid glowing tributes to the founding fathers of her Department for their monumental contributions to national development through knowledge-sharing with others, recalling that the first-ever Inaugural Lecture of the University was delivered by the founding Head of the Department of Linguistics, Prof. Oladele Awobuluyi, on February 15, 1979.

The Inaugural Lecture, which was presided-over by the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, represented by the Deputy Vice Chancellor (Management Services), Prof. Adegboyega Adisa Fawole, was attended by colleagues, friends, relations and students of Prof. Arokoyo from far and near.





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Soyinka cautions against abandoning indigenous languages

The Nobel Laureate was the Guest of Honour at the maiden edition of the institution's Cultural Week.

The renowned international statesman said that the abandonment of the local languages, traditions and materials is an act of cultural imperialism.

Prof. Soyinka, who is the first African Nobel Prize winner in Literature, explained that for Africa and Nigeria, specifically, to advance, citizens should dream, think and speak in our languages, saying that humanity would be richer if we prioritise what is ours.

The nonagenarian described languages as repositories of culture, history and intellection and must, therefore, be used as a tool of advancing national development.

He insisted that the abandonment of indigenous languages is like an attraction of wars on local histories and future development.

Welcoming the gradual reintroduction of the teaching of History in our schools, Prof. Soyinka explained that it is always important for us and particularly members of the younger generations to know how we get to the position we are for them to avoid mistakes committed along the lines to make the journey to proper nationhood easier.

While encouraging the study and adoption of Science and Technology, Prof. Soyinka said Humanities should not be abandoned.

He added that Humanities and Technology should be integrated, saying that the proper exploration of the former would regulate the use of the latter to the advantage of mankind.

On his view of the University of

Ilorin, Prof. Soyinka said that he had visited the institution before.

He commended the large expanse of land allocated to the University as he also said that the serene nature of the University makes it closer to nature, which he said would always be conducive for teaching, learning and research.

Prof. Soyinka equally commended the spate of progress being recorded by the University, saying that it is gradually closing up to its "elderly siblings".

he Department of Surveying and Geoinformatics, University of Ilorin, has held its maiden Ph.D. Colloquium in Surveying, Geoinformatics and Remote Sensing (SGRE).

The event, held last Thursday (May 22, 2025) at the Boardroom of the Faculty of Environmental Sciences, featured the presentation of abstracts, scholarly discussions, and research collaboration opportunities.

The colloquium served as a platform for doctoral candidates to showcase their ongoing research while engaging in critical peer review and expert evaluation.

The programme, which drew several distinguished academics and researchers from far and near, was organised in partnership with the Nigerian Institution of Surveyors (NIS), the International Federation of Surveyors (FIG), and the Organisation of Geoinformation Professionals (OGEP).

In his welcome address, the Head of the Department of Surveying and Geoinformatics, Dr Ayo Babalola, said that the colloquium featured a series of interactive workshops and panel discussions that allowed participants to exchange ideas and share real-world applications of SGRE technologies.

He explained that the programme was not only aimed at deepening the participants' understanding of remote sensing, geoinformatics, and surveying but also aimed at highlighting their transformative potentials in tackling climate change, disaster management, urban planning, and sustainable agriculture.



Dr Babalola also said that the atmosphere will birth collaboration, as students, researchers, and professionals would be encouraged to find a common ground in their passion for environmental sustainability.

In his address, the Dean of the Faculty, Prof. Ganiyu Amuda-Yusuf, said that the colloquium would generate commitment from various stakeholders so as to continue to build capacity and enhance data accessibility, particularly in underrepresented regions.

The Dean added that it was clear that the event had sparked a renewed sense of purpose and direction within the SGRE community, positioning it to play a critical role in shaping policy and practice for a more resilient and informed future.

The Head of the Department of Civil Engineering, University of Ilorin, who moderated the event, Prof. Oluwafemi Adeleke, advised the candidates that their topics should underpin their future research works, which will assist them to have a fantastic final research seminar.

Prof. Adeleke equally advised the

Ph.D. candidates to ensure that their proposals contain adequate budgets for their research and time scale for the reasearch work.

Four Ph.D. candidates presented papers at the event. Mr Ahmadu Hussein Adomu's presentation was entitled "Climate Change-Induced Flood Resilience Enhancement Using Machine Learning and GIS-Based Capacity Optimization Approach", while Mr Oyedapo Ipadeola's presentation was on "Assessment of Dam Deformation Threats in Kwara State, Nigeria"; Mr Omar Dahir Muazu's paper was entitled "Optimised Vertical Land Motion Estimation From SAR Using Cloud-Based Deep Learning Techniques" as Mr Yusuf Abdulganiyu's presentation was entitled "Integrating Machine Learning and GIS in Spatial Accessibility Research: A Global Biblometric Analysis (2015-2025)".

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Technology designed to ease human effort, not replace it - NASRDA DG

he Director-General of the National Space Research and Development Agency (NASRDA), Dr Matthew Olumide Adepoju, has emphasised that emerging technologies are not meant to replace human labour but to enhance and ease such efforts.

Dr Adepoju stated this last Tuesday (May 20, 2025), during the 3rd (Hybrid)Lecture Series, Awards and Endowment Funds organised by the Faculty of Physical Sciences, University of Ilorin at the University Auditorium. The programme was themed "Harnessing Emerging Technologies for Advancement in Science and Sustainable Development".

The Director-General, who was represented by Engr Fidelis Mandalla, said technologies, such as Artificial Intelligence (AI), have revolutionised scientific research, especially in areas like drug discovery, data analysis, and predictive modeling.

He also noted the profound impact of biotechnology on medicine, agriculture, and environmental sciences.

"Technology is not here to take away jobs but to make tasks easier and more efficient," he said.

He added that "today, you can shop from your home and have it delivered instantly. You can even attend events without physically being present."

However, Dr Adepoju acknowledged several challenges in adopting emerging technologies, including resistance to change, high implementation costs, shortage of skilled personnel, and ethical concerns.

Despite these hurdles, the Guest Speaker maintained that collaboration

between the government and private sector is essential for accelerated technological progress.

Dr Adepoju, therefore, called for support for inventors so as to make the society easier to live in.

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Euthanasia, a truly controversial issue-Alabi

he Head of the Department of Anatomy, University of Ilorin, Prof. Ade Stephen Alabi, has described euthanasia as a perpetually controversial and complex issue, saying that it has sparked intense and endless debates globally.

Prof. Alabi made this assertion last Wednesday (May 21,2025) while speaking at this year's edition of the Annual Euthanasia Prevention Initiative Week at the Faculty of Law Moot Court, University of Ilorin.

According to Prof. Alabi, euthanasia is the act of intentionally ending a person's life to relieve him of suffering, pain, or distress, often due to a terminal illness or incurable conditions.

Prof. Alabi highlighted the different types of euthanasia, which includes voluntary, non-voluntary, active, and passive euthanasia.

He noted that voluntary euthanasia involves a person requesting to end his life, while non-voluntary euthanasia occurs when the person is unable to make decisions, and someone else makes the decision on his behalf.

Prof. Alabi noted that 'the complexity of euthanasia is further compounded by the diverse factors that influence an individual's ability to cope with end-of-life challenges, adding that emotional resilience is a crucial life skill that plays significant role in navigating

these challenges.

He explained that emotional resilience has multifaceted nature, shaped by genetic predispositions, life experiences, personality traits, support systems, coping mechanisms, mental health, self-care practices, socioeconomic conditions, and cultural influences.

The don maintained that the interplay of these factors can either bolster or undermine an individual's capacity to cope with challenges, underscoring the importance of a comprehensive approach to building and maintaining emotional resilience.

Prof. Alabi emphasised that the debate around euthanasia raises fundamental questions about autonomy, dignity, quality of life, and the role of medicine in end-of-life care. He also pointed out that laws and regulations regarding euthanasia vary widely across countries and jurisdictions,

underscoring the complexity of the issue.

According to him, financial hardship and emotional distress can distort a person's judgment, turning what should be a voluntary choice into one made under pressure or desperation. "We cannot have an ethical conversation about euthanasia in isolation from the realities of poverty, loneliness, and mental health," he emphasised.

The Chairman of the Initiative, Prof. Bashir Omipidan, in his opening remarks, provided a nuanced exploration of the topic, encouraging attendees to think critically about the ethical, legal, and social implications of euthanasia.

Prof. Omipidan, who is a former Director of the Centre for Distance Learning (CoDL), University of Ilorin, noted that the event marked another step in the Euthanasia Prevention Initiative Group's ongoing campaign to raise awareness about the underlying issues influencing end-of-life decisions, and to promote a culture that values life even in the face of suffering.

The event encouraged participants from various backgrounds to reflect on personal and national experiences regarding euthanasia, with many advocating for preventive strategies rather than permissive legislations.

Present at the event included prominent legal luminaries such as Mr Bola Rasaq Gold, SAN; and Mr R. O. Bakare, Esq.; Dr Oluwabunmi Buhari, a renowned Consultant Psychiatrist; and Mrs Rukayat Abdulazeez, an expert in Public Law, among others.

₦50b Earned Allowance: UNILORIN NASU urges patience

he Chairman of the Non-Academic Staff Union of Educational and Associated Institutions (NASU), University of Ilorin Chapter, Mr Suberu Haruna Ibrahim, has urged members of the Union to exercise caution against raising unnecessary tension regarding the payment of the N50 billion earned allowance recently released by the Federal Government to University workers.

Mr Suberu made the appeal penultimate Tuesday (May 13, 2025) while featuring on "Table Talk", a current affairs programme of UNILORIN 89.3 FM. The programme was anchored by Mr Abdulkadir Yinka Saliu (Magaji Nda)

He noted that while there are speculations about the disbursement formula, no official document has neither been released nor received so far on the issue.



On the Union's successes, Mr Suberu said that the partial resolution, which exempts junior staff from cadre 1-5 from taking CBT examinations as part of the processes for promotion is a great accomplishment.

Other achievements enumerated by Mr Suberu include payment of welfare packages such as N300,000 for retiring

members and N100,000 for families of members who died in active service as he said that proper representation remains the best welfare package for NASU members.

Mr Suberu revealed that the Union is currently building a new hostel to support the University management's vision of providing accommodation for students on campus.

He also explained that the Union is eagerly awaiting the approval of a new career structure, which would be presented at the next Council meeting.

He assured that the Union will continue to prioritise the welfare and interests of its members.

The Chairman equally commended the University management, led by Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, for ensuring proper representation of all unions in all the institution's activities as he described the relationship between NASU and other unions as "mutual and cordial."



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Counseling Unit holds 'Heart-to-Heart Talk' with students

he University of Ilorin Counselling and Human Development Centre (UCHDC), in collaboration with the Faculty of Education, has organised a special counselling day programme for students. The programme was tagged "Heart-to-Heart Talk."

The event, held last Thursday (May 15, 2025) at the Faculty of Education Lecture Theatre, brought together students, health experts, and academic leaders together with a view to promoting mental health awareness and the importance of open emotional expression.

Declaring the event open, the Dean of the Faculty of Education, Prof. Lasiele Alabi Yahaya, commended the initiative as he emphasised the role of counselling in fostering students' academic success and psychological stability.

Prof. Yahaya urged students to take advantage of the University's counselling resources to navigate the complexities of academic and personal life

In her address, the Director of

UCHDC, Dr Foluke Bolu-Steve, charged students to develop the habit of seeking help from professional counsellors whenever they face emotional or psychological difficulties rather than taking personal or individual decisions, which sometimes lead to negative outcomes.

"Speaking to a trained counsellor is not a sign of weakness but a bold step towards healing and clarity," she noted.

In her presentation, Dr Eunice O. Isaac of the Department of Behavioural Sciences, University of Ilorin Teaching Hospital (UITH), spoke extensively on suicide ideation, suicide attempts, and prevention strategies.

Dr Isaac urged students to watch out for warning signs in themselves and others and not to shy away from seeking professional support.

A Principal Medical Officer at the University of Ilorin Health Centre, Dr Hikmah O. Amoloye, spoke on hormonal imbalance and prostate health.

Dr Amoloye explained how hormonal shifts can affect students' physical and emotional health, and encouraged regular health check-ups.

Also speaking the Deputy Director, Centre for Research, In-House Training and Development (CREDIT), Dr M. L. A. Mustapha, discussed the necessity of open dialogue in coping with life's challenges.

She emphasised that "heart-to-heart" talks are not just therapeutic but can be transformative in building resilience.

In her remarks, a University Counselling Officer, Mrs Zainab A. Basambo, expressed appreciation to the University management for its continuous support toward promoting students' welfare.

Speaking on behalf of male students, the President, Association of Students' Counsellor in Nigeria (ASCON), Mr Mathew Ibiwoye, lauded the organisers for providing a safe space to discuss sensitive issues.

"This programme has opened my eyes to things we often ignore. I now understand the value of talking and listening," he said.

Also speaking, Miss Memunat W. Maliki, President, Association of Social Sciences Education Students (ASSES), described the event as a "life-saving intervention."

She urged her peers, especially females, not to suppress their emotions, saying that speaking out is powerful and healing.

On the 2025 SSANU Day, the Chairman commended the Welfare Committee for organising the celebration within the constraints of current economic realities.

"Though modest, all financial members will benefit from what we have provided," he said.

Highlighting his administration's achievements, Mr Falowo outlined the completion and furnishing of the SSANU Secretariat Complex and the establishment of a crèche with modern amenities to assist staff who are nursing mothers as well as regular payment of the employment of the secretariat staff.

He equally cited the hosting of the 72nd Zonal Executive Committee Meeting, the facilitation of payment of hazard and responsibility allowances for staff and the resolution of long-standing issues such as the University school teachers and partial restoration of four months' withheld salaries, among several others.

The Chairman also announced that the Union had succeeded in reviewing the career structure to enable members attain Level 15, with the Council approval pending.

He emphasised that there are ongoing engagements with the University management on welfare issues, including the release of 2021 earned allowances.

Mr Falowo congratulated several members of the Association who secured one appointment or the other in institutions of higher learning across Nigeria.

While reaffirming his commitment to the services of the Union, Mr Falowo, who thanked all members for their support, noted that the University of Ilorin continues to "export excellence" through its members as he prayed for the repose of the souls of deceased members.

The event also witnessed the distribution of welfare package to members, presentation of certificates to deserving committee members, and special recognition of members appointed into higher positions.



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Balogun urges Accounting students to embrace digital literacy

Bees hold the key to human survival — Sadiku

he immediate past Head of the Department of Forest Resources Management, University of Ilorin, Dr Nusirat Aderinsola Sadiku, has said that bees are essential to human survival and their extinction could spell disaster for mankind.

She made this statement in a chat with *UNILORIN Bulletin* in her office last Tuesday (May 20, 2025) in commemoration of the World Bee Day, which is marked globally every May 20.

Dr Sadiku, a Senior Lecturer and environmental researcher, explained that bees are critical pollinators whose activities are directly linked to food production and ecological balance. She said that while bees can survive without humans, human beings cannot survive without bees, as the absence of pollination would severely impact agriculture and food security.

She further explained that the World Bee Day serves as an annual reminder of the need to protect bee populations across the globe, especially in light of rising threats such as climate

change, pesticide use, and habitat destruction.

Dr Sadiku added that she and some of her colleagues decided to join the global call for awareness by coming together as researchers from different countries to highlight the importance of bees, adding that without them, scientists estimate that humans may only survive for two to four years.

This year's celebration featured a collaborative effort involving Dr Sadiku, Mr Matthias Münch from Germany, and Mr Stafford Mgode from Tanzania. The three are partners in an ongoing international research project focused on beekeeping and pollinator conservation.

Mr Münch owns a beekeeping enterprise in Germany, Mr Mgode runs a similar initiative in Tanzania, while Dr. Sadiku represents Green Questers Associates, a research group based at the University of Ilorin.

According to Dr Sadiku, the joint research aims to understand pollinator health across different regions and develop strategies that support bee survival through sustainable practices.

She noted that in Nigeria, more attention must be given to protecting pollinators by enforcing environmental protection policies, promoting organic farming, and supporting local beekeepers.

Dr Sadiku praised the University of Ilorin for supporting research and conservation initiatives and called on government agencies and the public to join in the effort to safeguard bee populations.

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UNILORIN: A foundry for vice chancellors

he nation's most soughta f t e r University, the University of Ilorin, has since its establishment in 1975 produced several outstanding

and impactful individuals. These individuals have contributed and are still contributing their quotas to national and

human development in various ways.

Many of these eminent
Unilorites have served in high positions
in government, military and paramilitary
services and even as journalists,
diplomats and traditional rulers, among
other roles. Specifically, a number of
them are also in academia working
relentlessly towards building
responsible future leaders.

There is, in fact, no field of human endeavour that the University does not have a distinguished presence.

Of particular interest here is the fact that the institution has produced many Vice Chancellors for other universities within and outside Nigeria. The Vice Chancellors produced by the University are no fewer than 33 as at the last count.

This statistics shows that the University averagely produces one Vice Chancellor in every two years of its eventful history. This is relatively impressive compared with its peers that were brought forth 50 years ago.

Each of the Vice Chancellors produced by the University of Ilorin has evidently impacted profoundly on such beneficiary institutions to the glory of the Better-by-far University. These worthy products have served are still serving as worthy ambassadors of the University.

These individuals deserve to be celebrated as the University prepares to mark its 50 years of glorious existence. They are, in fact, an essential part of the history of the institution whose fascinating contributions should not be glossed over.

Apart from the founding heads of the institution who were "posted" to sister universities by the federal government in its embryonic stage, the trend of appointment of members of the University of Ilorin community as Vice Chancellors for other universities began with Prof. Suleiman Olatunji Adeyemi. Prof. Adeyemi, an indigene of Offa, Kwara State, and a distinguished scholar of Civil Engineering, was appointed Vice Chancellor of the Federal



University of Technology, Minna, Niger State by President Ibrahim Badamasi Babangida, GCFR, in 1990. He completed his single term of four years in 1994. He was the second Vice Chancellor of that University.

Before his appointment, Prof. Adeyemi was a lecturer at the UNILORIN's Department of Civil Engineering for many years. He returned to the same Department after his illustrious sojourn in Minna before his eventual retirement.

From the same Faculty of Engineering and Technology also emerged Prof. Sulyman Age Abdulkareem, FNSE, an eminent Chemical Engineer, who initially served as Vice Chancellor, Al-Hikmah University, Ilorin, before his appointment as the 10th Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin. He held the position from 2017 to 2022. Prof. J. A. Olorunmaiye of the Department of Mechanical Engineering also served as the pioneer Vice Chancellor of the Crown-Hill (now Ojaja) University, Eyenkorin, Ilorin. A Professor at the Department of Electrical Engineering, Tunji Samuel Ibiyemi, also served as the Vice Chancellor of Achievers University, Owo, Ondo State. From the same Department of Electrical Engineering, Prof. Nazmat Sirajudeen-Bakinde, was also, in 2024, appointed as the Vice Chancellor of the University of Science and Technology, The Gambia.

The star of this group of outstanding Unilorites is Prof. Is-haq Olanrewaju Oloyede, CON, FNAL. Prof. Oloyede, a distinguished Professor of Islamic Jurisprudence and celebrated administrator, is the first alumnus of the University of Ilorin appointed as a Vice Chancellor anywhere in the world! Prof. Oloyede, who earned all his degrees from the University of Ilorin and never served

elsewhere except at the same University before his emergence as the institution's Chief Executive, was remarkably the first product of the University who had the privilege of heading the institution. He was the Vice Chancellor of the University from 2007 to 2012. He is currently the Registrar and Chief Executive of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) and Secretary-General of the influential Nigerian Supreme Council for Islamic Affairs (NSCIA). He was rightly appointed as an Emeritus Professor by the University he is always proud of last year.

A former Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, who, professionally, also belongs to its Faculty of Arts, Prof. Shamsudeen Amali, OON, was after finishing his tenure at the University, which lasted between 2002 and 2007, appointed as the Vice Chancellor of Nassarawa State University, Keffi. Prof. Amali, a Theatre Arts expert, remains the only former Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin who headed another University after his five years nonrenewable term at UNILORIN.

The Faculty of Arts, "the heartbeat of the University", also produced the pioneer Vice Chancellor of the Kwara State University (KWASU), Malete, Prof. AbdulRasheed Na'Allah. Prof. Na'Allah was a student and staff at the Faculty. On completion of his tenure at KWASU, which he successfully ran between 2009 and 2019, Prof. Na'Allah was swiftly appointed as the Vice Chancellor of the University of Abuja. He rounded-off his tenure at the University in 2024, making him the only Nigerian who spent 15 unbroken years of his career serving as a Vice Chancellor. He has just emerged as the Pro-Chancellor and Chairman of the Governing Council of the newly-licensed AbdulRasaq Abubakar Toyin University, Ganmo, Ilorin.

Prof. Rasaq 'Deremi Abubakre, a renowned Professor of Arabic and former Dean of the Faculty of Arts, also served as Vice Chancellor of the Al-Hikmah University, Ilorin. He was the second Vice Chancellor of the private University. Prof. Mahofuz Adebola Adedimeji, a celebrated expert in English and prominent newspaper columnist, who was trained at the Faculty before his appointment as a lecturer at the same Faculty, was also appointed as the pioneer Vice Chancellor of the Ahman Pategi University, Pategi, Kwara State, the first private University in Nupeland. Prof. Adedimeji, a prolific wordsmith and current Chairman of UNILORIN Bulletin Editorial Board, is the incumbent Vice Chancellor of the African School of Economics, Abuja.

Another alumnus of the UNILORIN's Faculty of Arts, Prof. Shaykh Luqman Jimoh, in 2024, emerged as the third substantive Vice Chancellor of the Kwara State University, Malete. Prof. Jimoh, who is an expert in Islamic Studies, also received all his degrees from the University of Ilorin. He had previously held the same position in acting capacity for two years before his substantive appointment. Also from the same Faculty is Prof. Jelili Ojuade, an eminent scholar of dance, who is the current Vice Chancellor of Ojaja University, Evenkorin, Ilorin.

of Ojaja University, Eyenkorin, Ilorin. The Faculty of Agriculture, University of Ilorin also contributed to the pool of staff of the University who served or are serving as Vice Chancellors. They are a distinguished scholar of Animal Production, Prof. Olufemi Olaiya Balogun, who served as the Vice Chancellor of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta; and Prof. Luke Ayorinde, another foremost scholar of Animal Production, who served as the pioneer Vice Chancellor of Kola Daisi University, Ibadan and Thomas Adewumi University, Oko. The other two are Prof. Bashir Ademola Raji, who headed the Fountain University, Osogbo, as its second Vice Chancellor and whose tenure lasted between 2012 and 2017; and the current Vice Chancellor of the University, Prof. Olabisi Ramota Karim, who, before her appointment as the chief executive of the faith-based University, was the Dean of the Faculty. Prof. Joshua Olalekan Ogunwale of the Department of Agronomy also served as Vice Chancellor of Oduduwa University, Ile-Ife, Osun State between 2018 and 2023.

The Faculty of Law of the nation's most sought-after University has also produced two Vice Chancellors. Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, an alumnus (he earned his Ph.D. from the

University of Ilorin) and teacher at the Faculty, in 2022, emerged as the 11th Vice Chancellor of the University. This outstanding legal luminary is also the Secretary-General of the Association of West African Universities (AWAU) and Chairman, Consortium of Kwara Universities (KU8+). The Faculty similarly produced the second substantive Vice Chancellor of the Kwara State University, Malete, through the late Prof. Muhammad Mustapha Olarongbe Akanbi, SAN. From the Faculty of Social

Sciences and the Department of Sociology, to be specific, Prof. Noah Yusuf, was appointed as Vice Chancellor of the Al-Hikmah University, Ilorin. He is roundingoff his tenure at the nation's first faith-based University. Prof. O. J. Olaniran of the Department of Geography was also the pioneer Vice Chancellor of Ajayi Crowther University, Oyo. The UNILORIN's Department of Political Science also produced Prof. Matthew Olurotimi Ajayi, who served as the Vice Chancellor of Landmark University, Omu-Aran. In 2023, a former Dean of the Faculty of Communication and Information Sciences, Prof. Rasheed Gbenga Jimoh, became the pioneer Vice Chancellor of Muhammad Kamalud-Deen University, Ilorin. This consummate computer scientist is still driving the new faith-based University into maturity.

The "mother of all Faculties", the Faculty of Education, has also produced four Vice Chancellors. They are Prof. Raheem Adebayo Lawal, who emerged as the pioneer Vice Chancellor of the University of Offa, Offa; Prof. Medinat Folorunso Salman, the pioneer Vice Chancellor of the Kwara State University of Education, Ilorin, who was appointed in 2024; and Prof. Eric Nyarko-Sampson, who was appointed the Vice Chancellor of University of Environment and Sustainable Development by the Ghanaian authorities. The late Prof. Aize Obayan had earlier served as the Vice Chancellor of Covenant University, Otta, Ogun State.

The Faculty of Life Sciences equally produced four Vice Chancellors. Three of these distinguished scholars and administrators are remarkably from the Department of Biochemistry. The first was Prof. Musibau Akanji, who was the pioneer Vice Chancellor of the Al-Hikmah University, Ilorin. Prof. Akanji, thereafter, served as the 6th Vice Chancellor of the Federal University of Technology, Minna. He held the position with remarkable competence from 2012 to 2017.

The others are Prof. Hussein Oyelola Bukoye Oloyede, who was the pioneer Vice Chancellor of the Fountain University, Osogbo, and the Summit University, Offa; and Prof. Temidayo Oladiji, FNAS, who is the incumbent Vice Chancellor of the Federal University of Technology, Akure; as well as Prof. K. T. Eniola, who first served as the Vice Chancellor of Joseph Ayo Babalola University, Ikeji-Arakeji; and subsequently as Vice Chancellor, Kogi State University, Kabba.

State University, Kabba.

The Faculty of Veterinary
Medicine, University of Ilorin, which was
established about 15 years ago, has also
produced two Vice Chancellors. The
founding Dean of the Faculty, Prof.
AbdulGaniyu Ambali,OON, in October
2022 emerged as the 9th Vice Chancellor
of the University. He completed his tenure
in 2007. From the Faculty also emerged
Prof. Musa Isiyaku Ahmed, who left to
serve as the pioneer Vice Chancellor of
the Federal University of Agriculture,
Zuru, Kebbi State.

The above is in addition to many members of the University community who served as Pro-Chancellors of universities. These include its 6th Vice Chancellor, Prof. Shuaibu Oba AbdulRaheem, OFR, who is simultaneously holding the influential position at the Federal University Dutse, Muhammad Kamalud-Deen University, Ilorin; and the newly-established Kwara State University of Education, Ilorin. The University's 9th Vice Chancellor, Prof. AbdulGaniyu Ambali, OON, is also the current Pro-Chancellor of the Kwara State University, Malete. Prof. Olu Obafemi, mni, a seasoned newspaper columnist and distinguished national merit award winner, was the Pro-Chancellor of the Federal University of Technology, Minna; while a former Director of the University's Academic Planning Unit, Prof. Sulyman Alege Kuranga, also held the same position at Nnamdi Azikiwe University, Awka, Anambra State, among

Quite a number of Rectors of Polytechnics and Provosts of Colleges of Education, Colleges of Nursing and similar institutions as well as University Registrars and other principal officers of institutions of higher learning have been appointed from the University of Ilorin and among its products over the years.

What this parade of eminent scholars and prolific administrators shows is that the University of Ilorin is living up to expectations. It is proofing to be a warehouse of leaders and an institution where leadership values are always inculcated in students and staff members in order to bring out the best in them.

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Maiden Cultural Day Celebration

UNILORIN VC makes case for cultural preservation

he Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, has said that our culture demonstrates who we are and that our cultural heritage is something that is passed from generation to generation.

Prof. Egbewole said this last Wednesday (May 21, 2025) at the maiden edition of the University's Cultural Day, held at the University Auditorium.

The Vice Chancellor, who was represented by the Deputy Vice Chancellor (Management Services), Prof. Adegboyega Adisa Fawole, emphasised that Nigeria's rich cultural diversity, with over 500 languages and about 371 ethnic groups, is a testament to the strength and uniqueness of the nation. He noted that this diversity should be harnessed for unity and national development rather than division.

He commended the Centre for Cultural Studies and Creative Arts, University of Ilorin, the organisers of the event, for creating a platform where students and staff could celebrate their roots, express their identities, and learn about the traditions of others. According to him, events like this reinforce the University's commitment to promoting inclusiveness, peace, and mutual understanding among its diverse community.

Prof. Egbewole also urged the younger generation not to lose touch with their heritage in the face of globalisation, stressing that preserving culture is not only about attire, dance, or language

but also about embracing the values, norms, and wisdom handed down by our forebears.

h Director of the Centre for Cultural Studies and Creative Arts, University of Ilorin, Prof. Olutoyin Raymond Ogunade, said the institution's maiden Cultural Day was more than a ceremonial event, calling it "a scholarly and cultural intervention aimed at reclaiming identity in the face of global erasures.

Delivering his address at the event, Prof. Ogunade emphasised that culture is central to knowledge and nationhood, not just

an academic accessory. Referencing Nobel Laureate Wole Soyinka, he likened the celebration to a tiger's pounce and a bold assertion of cultural integrity.

Prof. Ogunade proposed that the University set aside every Monday as Cultural Attire Day, where staff and students would wear their indigenous attire, not just for fashion, but as a conscious affirmation of identity. He noted that similar initiatives in other postcolonial institutions have strengthened academic excellence and cultural pride.

Addressing affordability concerns, the Director suggested launching a 'Cultural Wear Initiative' through the Centre, in partnership with local designers, alumni, and sponsors, to make traditional attire accessible to all. He urged the academic community to resist residual Western influences on dress and self-perception, stating that to dress culturally is to declare identity, remember heritage, and resist cultural erasure

In his address, the Nobel Laureate, Prof. Wole Soyinka, echoed the call to preserve Nigeria's rich cultural heritage. He warned against the silent erosion of indigenous values and traditions, stressing that allowing Nigerian culture to go extinct is equivalent to erasing the essence of the nation itself.

Prof. Soyinka, who was represented by a renowned cultural scholar and artist, Dr Wole Alade, a former Director of the MUSON Centre, Lagos, passionately urged the youth to take pride in their heritage, language, attire, and customs, rather than blindly adopting foreign influences.
