
Reliable data crucial for national growth, academic research - Egbewole


he Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, has explained the critical role of data in academic research and national development, urging institutions, policymakers, and stakeholders to invest more in data gathering, management, and utilisation.

he Vice Chancellor, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, was one of the distinguished guests at the 7th University of L'Aquila Conference on Euro-African Partnership last Wednesday (October 29, 2025).

Prof. Egbewole was specially invited to the Conference along with the Vice Chancellor of Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology (KNUST) Kumasi, Ghana, Prof. Rita Akosua Dickson.

Themed 'Euro-African Academic and Scientific

Cooperation: A Sign of Hope', the Conference was part of the collaborative academic Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed between UNILORIN and the University of L'Aquila, Italy.

The Rector of the University of L'Aquila, Italy, Prof. Fabio Graziosi, said, in the invitation letter to Prof. Egbewole, that the Conference is of particular strategic interest to enhance the workability of the MoU.

The Vice Chancellor, who was represented by the Deputy Vice Chancellor (Academic), Prof. Moji Taibat Bakare-Odunola, noted that Nigeria's ability to plan effectively and achieve sustainable development depends largely on the availability and proper use of reliable data, adding that, database generation supports research, enhances innovation, and aids policymakers in formulating targeted and impactful solutions.

The Vice Chancellor commended the Afrobarometer Initiative for its commitment to evidence-based research and its emphasis on public opinion as a tool for addressing societal challenges. He assured the team of the University's readiness to collaborate with Afrobarometer in promoting data-driven research and improving access to information that can influence policy and societal progress.

Speaking earlier, the Afrobarometer Capacity Building Manager, Dr Kamal Yakubu, described Nigeria as a vast and vibrant country with enormous potential for data-driven research and evidence-based policymaking. He noted that the rich body of secondary data already available in Nigeria could be effectively used to triangulate and strengthen primary data sources, thereby improving the quality and reliability of academic research.

Dr Yakubu, however, stated that the Afrobarometer outreach programme is designed to engage with universities across Africa, with the aim of introducing the Afrobarometer platform, building research capacity, and encouraging the use of data in academic and policy-related work.

In his remarks, the Dean of the Faculty of Agriculture, Prof. Israel Ogunlade, explained that the partnership between the University and Afrobarometer was initiated through the efforts of a Senior

Lecturer in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Farm Management, Dr Mercy F. Salami, who came across the pan-African research organisation during an international conference she attended.

Prof. Ogunlade said that Dr Salami discovered that Afrobarometer generates reliable data sets similar to those produced by global institutions such as the World Bank, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), and the United Nations (UN). However, it was observed that much of the data produced by Afrobarometer was not being adequately utilised by Nigerian researchers and institutions.

He noted that the Afrobarometer team decided to extend their outreach to the University of Ilorin to introduce their data resources, demonstrate how they can be accessed, and train both staff and students on how to analyse and apply the data for academic and policy-oriented research.

He added that while going anywhere they must ensure that they board only properly labelled commercial vehicles and must ensure that they get the registration numbers of such vehicles recorded and sent to a trusted friend.

He particularly advised them to ensure that they do not accept free rides from unknown motorists and if they must do, such vehicles should be those without tinted glasses.

Mr Alfanla also advised the students to keep the side windows of

such vehicles wound down so that they can easily raise alarm at any time the driver or any other passenger on board decide to play games.

On the ongoing transportation challenges on campus, Mr Alfanla said that it would soon be a thing of the past.

He explained that the management is not unaware of the challenges as he assured the University Community that the management is working round the clock to find lasting solutions to the challenges.

Mr Alfanla said that the

management had already secured the services of mass transit buses (soludero) owned by the Kwara State Government to help in conveying students from the new park into the school area.

He implored other transport companies, community development organisations and well-to-do individuals to partner with the University authorities towards eradicating the challenge.

Mr Alfanla explained that with over 50,000 students and staff anyone who invests in transport services in the University would surely be doing a profitable business.

The Deputy Vice Chancellor, who is also the Chairman of the Ceremonials Committee, explained that the events were quite colourful as they also recorded the attendance of a large number of dignitaries and other individuals from far and near.

He explained that each of the programmes lined up for the ceremonies were held as planned as he said that no significant unusual incidence was reported.

Prof. Fawole thanked the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, and members of his management team for their support. He also thanked the entire members of the Ceremonials Committee for delivering commendable programmes.

The Chairman said that each of

he Chairman of the Senate Committee on Aviation, Senator Abdulfatai Omotayo Buhari, will on Wednesday, November 26, 2025 chair the Alumni Day of the upcoming Golden Jubilee cerebration of the University of Ilorin.

This was disclosed by the Chairman of the Alumni Day Sub-Committee of the Anniversary, Prof. Waheed Babatunde Yahya, in a chat with *UNILORIN Bulletin* in his Office last Thursday (October 29, 2025).

He said that apart from Senator Buhari, who graduated from the institution's Department of Business Administration in 1985 and has been representing Oyo North Senatorial District at the Senate since 2015, another distinguished alumnus of the University who served as Governor of Kwara State from 2011 to 2019, Alhaji Abdulfatai Ahmed, would be one of the Guest Speakers at the event.

Other Guest Speakers are Dr Nimota Nihilola Akanbi, OON, a former Nigerian Ambassador to Netherlands and Dr Ademola Dada, a former Medical Director of the Federal Medical Centre, Ebute-Mete, Lagos. Both Dr Akanbi and Dr Dada are also alumni of the Faculty of Education and the College of Health Sciences, respectively.

Prof. Yahya, who is also an

alumnus of the University, said that the event, which would be held at the University Auditorium, is expected to bring together alumni of the University and their friends from all over the country and beyond.

The Sub-Committee Chairman said that the Alumni Day was specifically set aside for products of the University to fraternise and compare notes on the progress they have recorded since their graduation.

Prof. Yahya, who is also the Director of the University Advancement Centre, said that the programme would also avail the alumni the opportunity to

Balogun, UNILORIN ex-Registrar, seeks better cooperation among academic, non-teaching staff

he third Registrar of the University of Ilorin, Mr Murtala Tunde Balogun, has called for greater cooperation among the academic and non-teaching staff members of Nigerian universities in order to facilitate better management of the institutions.

Mr Balogun, who served as Registrar and Secretary to the University Governing Council between 1998 and 2003, made this plea last Monday (October 27, 2025) while featuring on 'Countdown to UNILORIN @ 50', a special personality interview programme of *UNILORIN 89.3 FM*, which is dedicated to the celebration of the upcoming anniversary.

The former Registrar said that no university or institution of higher learning will achieve its essence in the absence of effective synergy between the two groups of staff.

Mr Balogun, who recalled several challenging episodes during his days in office to justify his position, said that if there was no cooperation between the two groups the challenges encountered by the University could have threatened its survival.

He noted that students and other stakeholders are bound to suffer when teachers and administrators do not work together in the interests of the University.

Speaking on other issues, Mr Balogun encouraged stakeholders to ensure that universities are properly funded for them to achieve their corporate objectives.

While saying that poor funding is inimical to proper running of universities, the renowned administrator said that the tendency of turning universities to glorified secondary schools should be resisted as he said that it could lead to attenuation of the essence of university education.

Mr Balogun, who is a member of the pioneer staff of the University, said that he was always delighted that the University has grown to become one of the most respected and admired institutions of higher learning in Nigeria.

The former Registrar said that the Golden Jubilee of the University deserves to be celebrated, pointing out that doing so is a way of thanking God for His mercies.

He added that those who know the history of the University and how it started would agree with him that the journey of the University so far needed to be

celebrated.

Mr Balogun, who is also the pioneer Registrar of the Federal Polytechnic, Offa, enjoined the authorities of the University to ensure that entrepreneurs are swiftly engaged to make meaningful use of its expansive landmass for agricultural and other economic uses.

The former Registrar also said that he was happy that most of those that were recruited during his time as Registrar of the University are now holding important positions in the institution and helping to raise its flag higher.

On what he wanted the future of the University to look like, Mr Balogun, who is now in his early 80s, expressed the hope that the University will become more internationalised as it advances in age.

Mr Balogun said that a University that is only peopled by its products and their colleagues from nearby institutions as teachers and administrators does not deserve to be called a University because a good University must be universal in its student enrolment, staff recruitment and general orientations.

While affirming the fact that the University of Ilorin has always been known for peace, the former Registrar advised its leadership to ensure that no effort is spared at ensuring that the peace of the University is maintained.

Relocation of UNILORIN Park aligns with varsity's masterplan, says Akanmu

he Dean of Student Affairs, University of Ilorin, Dr Alex Akanmu, has explained that the relocation of the University Park to its new site aligns with the institution's masterplan and addresses security concerns.

Dr Akanmu stated this last Tuesday (October 29, 2025) while speaking with UNILORIN Bulletin in his office.

The Dean noted that the initial location didn't fit the plan, saying that the move ensures staff and students have access to registered vehicles with enhanced security guarantees.

Dr Akanmu explained that the recent congestion recorded at the park

was due to fresh students coming to campus with large number of luggage, causing a surge in the demand for vehicles. He advised students to adapt to the new system.

He also urged students, especially freshers, to adhere to the University's rules and regulations to enable them to complete their academic programmes smoothly and on time.

The don, who is also the Chairman, University of Ilorin Branch of the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU), commended the Federal Government for introducing the Nigeria Education Loans Fund (NELFUND), noting its significant impact on University of Ilorin students. He assured that efforts will continue to ensure that freshers also benefit from the scheme.

The Dean appealed to well-to-do Nigerians to partner with the University by building more private hostels in order to foster a better learning environment.

American don tasks UNILORIN Chem. Eng. students on skills for professional relevance

Professor of Chemical Engineering at the famous Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), United States of America, Tom Kinney, has emphasised the importance of openness and curiosity among Engineering students, particularly those of the Department of Chemical Engineering, University of Ilorin, in order for them to achieve lifelong relevance.

Prof. Kinney gave this advice penultimate Wednesday (October 22, 2025) while presenting a virtual seminar, titled "Getting It Right: Transitions From Chemical Engineering to the Industry" to students and staff members of the Department. The seminar was facilitated by a Senior Lecturer at the Department, Dr Mary Ajala.

The American don said that the students needed to be open and inquisitive so that they can expose themselves to diverse experiences and for them to be able to network widely to achieve consistent relevance.

The renowned scholar advised Unilorites to step outside their comfort zones, pursue internships, and take advantage of available learning opportunities.

He also implored them to deliberately bridge the gap between theoretical knowledge and industrial practice as he described Chemical Engineers as the "connecting tissue" between Chemists and Mechanical Engineers in problem-solving processes.

Prof. Kinney equally highlighted the importance of transparent communication, sharing assumptions, calculations, and research as he said that success in industry requires both technical and interpersonal skills.

Speaking on misconceptions that needed to be overcome early in their career, Prof. Kinney explained that industry operations differ significantly from classroom experiences as he pointed out that precision and accountability are critical because errors are costly.

He reminded them that stakeholders would always value clear and decisive outcomes over complex theoretical explanations as he urged young engineers to focus on action, sound judgment and delivering results effectively.

Prof. Kinney equally advised

participants to define expectations by understanding what their roles require and what they, in turn, expect from the organisation.

He said that by meeting and exceeding these expectations, professionals can distinguish themselves and achieve long-term success.

While responding to a question, Prof. Kinney encouraged participants to ensure that they effectively merge "confidence with substance and perseverance".

In his remarks, the Head of the Department of Chemical Engineering, University of Ilorin, Dr E. O. Ajala encouraged students to strengthen professional networks and foster collaborations between MIT and her Department.

He also expressed gratitude to the Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof.Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, for his continuous support to the University's Chemical Engineering programme and for granting permission for her and her colleagues to participate in the MIT-ETT Fellowship.

Also speaking, an Associate Professor at the Department of Chemical Engineering, Dr George Adeniyi, commended Dr Mary Ajala for her initiative. He also thanked Prof. Kinney for his time and valuable contributions.

The seminar was attended by students and lecturers of the Department of Chemical Engineering, University of Ilorin.

Adedimeji hails UNILORIN dominance in Nigerian varsities' media space

n an apparent acknowledgment of the increasingly exciting service delivery of the Director and staff members of the Directorate of Corporate Affairs, University of Ilorin, the Vice Chancellor of African School of Economics (The Pan-African University of Excellence (ASE), Abuja, Prof. Mahfauz Adebola Adedimeji, has commended the pioneering and fascinating efforts of the University in the running and maintenance of successful educational media outfits in Nigeria.

Prof. Adedimeji, who is also the pioneer Vice Chancellor of the Ahman Pategi University, Patigi, gave this commendation in an article titled "50 Facts That Make UNILORIN Fantastic @ 50", which he dedicated to the celebration of the institution's Golden Jubilee.

The Vice Chancellor pointed out that "in the media domain, UNILORIN is the first Nigerian University to establish a weekly newsletter that has run consistently for more than one and a half decades".

He also explained that the University is the first to establish a campus radio station, *UNILORIN 89.3 FM*, that operates 24 hours a day and seven days a week. The station, which is currently headed by a seasoned broadcaster, Mr Idris Akintola Ibrahim (Aloma), was established in 2009.

Prof. Adedimeji also said that the University of Ilorin remains one of the few universities with an online Television Channel, which is called *UNILORINTV*.

The distinguished Professor of English equally said that the University emerged as the institution with the highest engagement on the social media, a performance, which he said, culminated in an award in that category granted by the

Nigerian Institute of Public Relations (NIPR) at an event held in Abuja earlier in the year.

Prof. Adedimeji, a distinguished alumnus of the University who was also among those recently inaugurated as UNILORIN Ambassadors, recalled that the University was also the first Nigerian University that won the prestigious New Telegraph's Outstanding University Award in 2023 under the Vice Chancellorship of Prof. Wahab Egbewole, SAN.

The Directorate of Information (which became Directorate of Corporate Affairs in 2011), which incorporates all the four media outfits, was established in 1999 by the administration of the 6th Vice Chancellor of the University, Prof. Shuaibu Oba AbdulRaheem, OFR, and strengthened by subsequent administrations headed by Prof. Shamusudeen O. O. Amali, OON; Prof. Is'haq Olanrewaju Oloyede, CON; Prof. AbdulGaniyu Ambali, OON; Prof. Sulyman Age Abdulkareem, FNSE; and the incumbent, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN.

The award-winning Directorate, whose operations and organisational structures have been consistently

commended by stakeholders and understudied by several universities and institutions of higher learning across Nigeria, was initially headed by the then Mr (now Prof.) Isiaka Zubair Aliagan, who piloted its affairs from 1999 to 2008. Prof. Aliagan, prior to his engagement by the University, served as Editor of the Kwara State Government-owned *The Herald* newspaper after several years of services in the flagship of the Nigerian press, *The Guardian*.

Prof. Adedimeji, a renowned wordsmith and outstanding author, who, as at the time, was also a lecturer at the University's Department of English, headed the professional Directorate between 2008 and 2012 while its current head, who is also its first substantive Director, is a seasoned journalist and consummate Public Relations practitioner, Mr Kunle Akogun. Mr Akogun has competently headed the Unit since 2012, which has made him to work with the institution's four successive Vice Chancellors, Prof. Oloyede, Prof. Ambali, Prof. Abdulkareem and the incumbent, Prof. Egbewole.

Ambali harps on mentorship among academics

he immediate past Deputy Vice Chancellor (Management Services), Prof. Suleiman Folorunsho Ambali, has stressed the need for quality mentorship in academic settings.

Prof. Ambali, who is also the University Project Manager for Ranking Implementation, gave this advice recently while delivering a lecture, titled "Cross-Generational Mentorship: Bridging Traditional Academic Values with Contemporary Realities," at the 7th edition of the commencement ceremony of the Faculty of Life Sciences, University of Ilorin at the New Science Lecture Theatre (NSLT). The event was also used to celebrate a total of 41 higher-degree graduates, comprising 13 Ph.D. holders and 28 Master degree recently produced by the Faculty.

The former Deputy Vice Chancellor stated that while the academic environment continues to evolve rapidly, traditional scholarly values such as rigour, ethical conduct, discipline, patience, and methodological thoroughness remain indispensable.

According to him, true academic progress does not emerge from generational competition but from a strategic fusion of strengths of the old and the young.

Prof. Ambali, who teaches at the Department of Veterinary Pharmacology and Toxicology, noted that senior academics possess deep institutional memory, resilience, and disciplinary mastery, while younger scholars bring digital fluency, global academic exposure, collaborative research habits, advanced data tools, and innovative

teaching methodologies.

He stressed that knowledge in academia flows in both directions: senior faculty members guide younger colleagues in ethical research, career progression, and institutional culture, while younger academics help older colleagues adopt digital tools, embrace open science practices, and apply contemporary pedagogical approaches.

Prof. Ambali identified pride, fear, and assumptions, rather than lack of willingness, as the biggest obstacles to effective mentorship.

"Older academics may fear appearing outdated; younger ones may fear looking inexperienced or incompetent," he added.

He emphasised the need for humility and safe mentoring environments where senior scholars can comfortably learn from younger colleagues and junior staff can ask questions without intimidation.

Prof. Ambali, who is also a former Dean, Faculty of Veterinary Medicine, stressed that mentorship must be valued institutionally, not left as a silent act of goodwill as he advocated cross-generational research teams, routine thematic mentorship circles, protection of mentorship time, recognition of mentorship in academic evaluations, and open acknowledgement of mutual learning.

The Guest Lecturer also explained that while modern knowledge systems embrace open science, data sharing, and rapid dissemination, these innovations must coexist with academic integrity, accuracy, and ethical responsibility, particularly in the Life Sciences, where poor or rushed research poses risks to public health, agriculture, biodiversity, and the environment.

Prof. Ambali called on universities to honour their scholarly heritage while embracing the future, fostering curiosity over defensiveness, and building institutional systems that reward humility, collaboration, and lifelong learning.

Speaking earlier, the Dean of the Faculty, Prof. R. O. Arise, expressed appreciation to Prof. Ambali for accepting the invitation without hesitation despite his demanding schedule.

The Dean described the programme as a celebration of perseverance, intentional mentorship, independent research, and scholarly excellence.

Prof. Arise also congratulated the higher degree graduands, urging them to continue the culture of mentorship and excellence as they progress in their careers.

The event was attended by distinguished scholars, Heads of Departments, Professors, academic staff, technical and administrative staff, and students of the Faculty of Life Sciences, among others.

My recognition, a call to deepen inquiry, UNILORIN Researcher of the Year

he University of Ilorin 2025 Researcher of the Year, Dr AbdulGafar Fahm, has described his recognition as a call to deepen inquiry into how faith, ethics, and technology intersect in an increasingly digital world.

Dr Fahm, who disclosed this last Monday (October 27, 2025) in a chat with UNILORIN Bulletin, said he would continue to explore the intersection of Islamic ethics and digital transformation, focused on how Muslim societies in Nigeria navigate the moral, educational, and epistemological challenges of the digital age.

Dr Fahm, who teaches at the Department of Religions, said, "It was deeply humbling and gratifying. This award affirms years of patient scholarship, collaboration, and curiosity, reminding me that knowledge is both personal devotion and public service. The research is often a solitary endeavour, but such recognition by one's institution is an energising reminder that the pursuit of knowledge contributes meaningfully to our collective academic mission," he said.

He said that his groundbreaking research explores the intersection of Islamic ethics and digital transformation, focusing on how Muslim societies in Nigeria are responding to the moral, epistemological, and educational implications of technology. His work examines how online platforms are reshaping Islamic learning, religious authority, and ethical reasoning in the digital age.

"I have been exploring how classical principles such as adab (ethical conduct), niyyah (intention), and maslahah (public good) can guide responsible engagement in the digital space," he explained.

He revealed that the recognition reflects a culmination of his academic contributions between 2021 and 2025, including high-impact publications in Q1

journals, leadership roles in collaborative projects, research grants secured, and the mentoring of graduate students.

"These efforts, both academic and administrative, were evaluated as part of the process that led to this recognition," he said, adding that meaningful research outcomes go beyond citations to touching lives and institutions.

Dr Fahm said his motivation to study the ethical dimensions of digital life in Islam was inspired by observing how technology is rapidly transforming knowledge acquisition and religious discourse.

"As an Islamic ethicist, I became interested in how classical values could inform digital practice. The online world is not morally neutral. It requires frameworks rooted in spiritual discipline and communal good," he explained.

On the delicate balance between tradition and modernity in research, Dr Fahm stressed that integration, not opposition, is key.

He said, "I grounded my research in the Qur'an, Hadith, and classical Islamic thoughts, but I also employ interdisciplinary tools such as digital ethnography, discourse analysis, and data-driven social research to interpret contemporary realities. Tradition provides the moral compass; modern methodology provides the analytical lens."

Dr Fahm identified limited funding for humanities research, poor access to digitised manuscripts, and the challenge of situating Islamic Studies within global academic debates as major constraints confronting researchers in the field.

"The discipline must evolve to address fast-changing socio-ethical realities that classical frameworks did not anticipate," he said, noting that continuous dialogue between Islamic scholarship and modern realities is crucial.

Dr Fahm commended the University of Ilorin for sustaining an environment that promotes research excellence.

"The University provides growing digital infrastructure, facilitates grants, and nurtures a vibrant community of scholars. Its emphasis on productivity, ethical excellence, and mentorship has been instrumental in my academic journey," he said.

He also revealed that he is actively involved in international research collaborations linking Nigerian and European institutions.

"I am engaged in projects on Digital Pathways and Islamic Learning, examining Yoruba-Muslim communities, and I collaborate with colleagues in Germany and the UK on issues of religion, morality, and technology," he said.

Dr Fahm, who currently serves as a LUCAS-LAHRI Virtual Visiting Research Fellow at the University of Leeds, United Kingdom, disclosed that, on ensuring his research transcends the academic environment, there is the need for impact-driven scholarship.

He said, "I engage policymakers, educators, and faith-based organisations. My research aims to inform ethical digital literacy programmes, contribute to peacebuilding, and guide youth engagement with technology. Scholarship should not end in journals; it should inspire responsible citizenship and social transformation."

Looking to the future, Dr Fahm disclosed that his next line of inquiry will focus on how class, gender, and access shape digital religious engagement, building on his ongoing efforts to develop an Islamic framework for digital ethics suited to Africa's knowledge landscape. Offering advice to emerging researchers.

He advised researchers to "be intellectually curious, methodologically rigorous, and ethically grounded. Let your research serve humanity. Remember that humility is the hallmark of true scholarship as research is service to knowledge, to community, and to God."

he University of Ilorin Innovator of the Year(2025), Dr Folusho Bankole, has disclosed that behind her recognition is the development of three climate-smart maize varieties that promise to change the fortunes of farmers battling drought and the notorious parasitic weed, Striga hermonthica.

Speaking with *UNILORIN* Bulletin last Monday (October 27, 2025) after the award penultimate Thursday (October 24, 2025), Dr Bankole described the honour as a collective victory, celebrating not just personal efforts but teamwork, divine grace, and institutional support.

She said, "This award is profoundly meaningful to me, and I see it not as an individual achievement but as a collective effort. It reflects God's grace, the dedication of my research team, the support of my family, the guidance of my mentors, and the enabling environment created by the leadership of the University, from the Vice Chancellor to the Faculty and the Department."

Dr Bankole, who teaches at the Department of Agronomy, said that the award-winning innovation, which began with the development, registration, and release of ILOMAZ 1, 2, and 3, marks a breakthrough in Crop Science, adding that the new maize varieties, tailored for

Nigeria's Guinea Savanna, are highyielding, drought-tolerant, and resilient against Striga, one of the deadliest weeds plaguing African maize farms.

According to her, the project was borne out of a commitment to tackle food insecurity and climate challenges threatening farmers' livelihoods.

"We wanted to provide a robust, scientific solution to low yields caused by drought and Striga," she explained.

She said that the innovation emerged from a rigorous, multi-stage process, including multi-location trials, participatory field testing with farmers, and independent evaluation by the National Varietal Release Committee before final certification.

The innovator noted that the journey was not smooth, stressing that from insecurity in field sites to herds of cattle trampling experimental plots as the team had to navigate setbacks that tested their resolve.

"These challenges only strengthened our resilience and determination," she recalled.

According to her, beyond the laboratory, the work is already transforming lives, as farmers in Kwara, Niger, Osun, and Oyo States have recorded higher yields and better incomes after adopting the new varieties.

She said, "This innovation aligns perfectly with UNILORIN's mission to generate research that impacts

communities. It also advances the UN Sustainable Development Goals on Zero Hunger, No Poverty, and Good Health," she said.

Dr Bankole believed the potential for commercialisation is immense, adding that with its proven yield advantage, the ILOMAZ varieties could deliver returns of over 100% for seed companies and farmers in some regions.

She called for a stronger innovation ecosystem within universities, built on mentorship, funding, entrepreneurship training, and industry partnerships.

"Innovation thrives where ideas are nurtured, risks are supported, and collaboration is encouraged," she noted.

Reflecting on what fuels her creativity, she pointed to collaboration and curiosity, noting that, "I stay creative through learning and networking with colleagues in universities, research institutes, and industries. I am always asking new questions and seeking better solutions."

To aspiring innovators, she advised, "Start where you are, use what you have, and work on problems you care about. Embrace teamwork and learn from setbacks. The University of Ilorin provides a fertile ground for innovation, make the most of it. Your persistence can lead to discoveries that change the world." she said.

UNILORIN Counsellor advocates safer, Inclusive campus community

Counsellor at the Counselling and Human Development Centre, University of Ilorin, Mrs Sherifat Tinuke Oniye, has urged students of the institution to champion a culture whereby every individual feels physically safe and emotionally included in order to foster a truly thriving academic community.

Mrs Oniye gave this advice last Monday (October 27, 2025) while speaking on "Meet the Counselor", a weekly counselling programme of UNILORIN 89.3 FM. The programme was anchored by Mrs Idayat Hassan.

She explained that safety and inclusion are two pillars of a healthy student experience, describing safety as the "floor" and inclusion as the "ceiling" necessary for students to reach their highest potential.

Addressing the need for a robust support system, the counsellor outlined the network of help available to students, including the University Security Unit, the University Health Centre, the Dean of Student Affairs' office, and the Counselling and Human Development Centre for psychological and emotional support.

"Seeking help is a sign of strength and self-awareness, not weakness," Mrs Oniye noted as she reassured students who might feel

stigmatised about seeking counselling. "You see a doctor for a physical cough, you see a counsellor for emotional or mental distress", she said.

On the value of fostering inclusion, Mrs Oniye pointed out that subtle acts like microaggressions can be as damaging as overt threats. She advised students to be builders of an inclusive community by actively reaching out to those who seem different or isolated.

During an interactive session with listeners, Mrs Oniye addressed pressing student concerns, offering practical guidance. Responding to an anonymous student who reported feeling embarrassed by a lecturer's tribal jokes, she validated the student's feelings, classifying such acts as microaggressions.

"Your education and dignity are paramount," Mrs Onive stated, advising the student to either calmly address the issue privately with the lecturer or formally report it to the Head of Department or the Dean of Student Affairs' office.

On fostering personal connections, she counselled an introverted student to seek out lowpressure, interest-based groups and reassured them that introversion is a strength. "Belonging starts with one or two genuine connections, not a crowd,' she noted.

When asked about the University's active role in promoting inclusion, Mrs Oniye highlighted ongoing initiatives such as seminars on cultural awareness, the celebration of cultural weeks, and workshops on 'Intercultural Communication' organised by the Counselling Centre.

The counsellor charged every student to become a proactive "builder" of the campus community as she also urged them to enhance safety by being vigilant and promoting inclusion through simple and kind gestures.

"Reach out to one person who seems different from you or who is sitting alone. Smile, ask for his or her name, and listen. That single act of kindness can change someone's entire university experience," Mrs Oniye counselled.

Adedimeji outlines anti-poverty strategies, tasks Nigerians on work ethics

he Vice Chancellor of the African School of Economics (The Pan-African University of Excellence (ASE), Abuja, Prof. Mahfouz Adedimeji, has called on Nigerian youths to take proactive steps to protect themselves from poverty amid current economic challenges.

Prof. Adedimeji stated this last Sunday (October 26, 2025), while delivering a lecture, 'Overcoming E c o n o m i c C r i s i s a n d Multidimensional Poverty: Exploring Pathways to Prosperity', at the October edition of the lecture series organised by the University of Ilorin Muslim Graduates Association (UNILOMGA). The lecture was part of activities marking the 50th anniversary of the University.

He explained that since ancient times, human needs have revolved around food, clothing and shelter, all of which are economic in nature. Meeting these basic needs, he said, would help solve many of the challenges confronting millions of Nigerians.

Prof. Adedimeji noted that this understanding has shaped the curriculum at his university, where

economic literacy is integrated into every field of study as a foundational element of training, a model he described as innovative in higher education.

Defining multidimensional poverty as the lack of education, poor health, low living standards and inadequate access to basic services, the Vice Chancellor stressed that escaping poverty requires capacity development through education, skills acquisition, and the creation of marketable products or income-generating services.

He also identified minimising expenditure and maximising income as time-tested strategies for navigating a crisis-prone economy, while advising young people to embrace volunteering as a means of gaining valuable experience and future opportunities.

Prof. Adedimeji further distinguished between economic crisis, instability, independence, and freedom, attributing multidimensional poverty in Africa to factors such as economic imbalances, social inequality, political instability and environmental challenges. He cited World Bank data showing that poverty in rural Nigeria stands at about 75 per cent.

The Vice Chancellor lauded the Federal Government's ongoing reforms under President Bola Tinubu, noting early signs of improvement, including the appreciation of the naira and an increase in real GDP growth from 3.0 per cent in 2024 to 4.23 per cent in 2025.

"Nigeria's pathway to prosperity lies in diversifying the economy, improving education and healthcare, strengthening social safety nets, expanding infrastructure, and ensuring good governance and accountability," Prof. Adedimeji said.

He also encouraged Nigerians to uphold sound work ethics and nurture faith, trust, patience and hope.

Besides, UNILORIN produced the Vice President of the Association of African Universities (AAU) in Prof. Shamsudeen Amali, the seventh Vice Chancellor (23). It is the first Nigerian university to produce the President of the Association of Vice Chancellors of Nigerian Universities (AVCNU) and AAU at the same time as recorded in Prof. Emeritus Is-haq Oloyede, CON, the eighth Vice-Chancellor (24). It is also the first Nigerian university to be ranked among the best 20 universities in Africa in 2011 (25) and the only one to be consistently ranked best in Nigeria for many years by international ranking agencies (26). It is equally the first to introduce Computer-Based Test for screening students in the Nigerian university system in 2008 (27) and the university with the first Student Union to utilise e-voting as a way engendering electoral integrity and transparency, first experimented in 2012 and perfected 2013 under the Vice Chancellorship of Prof. Abdulganiyu Ambali, OON (28).

In the media domain, UNILORIN is the first Nigerian university to establish a weekly newsletter that has run consistently for more than one and a half decades (Unilorin Bulletin) (29); the first to establish a campus radio station that operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week (UNILORIN 89.3 FM) (30); one of the few with an online Television Channel (UNILORIN TV) (31); one with the highest engagement on the social media culminating in an award in that category in 2025 (32); and the first Nigerian university to win the New Telegraph's outstanding university award in 2023 under the Vice Chancellorship of

Prof. Wahab Egbewole, SAN (33).

Better by far, Best by standard

In academic excellence, the University takes the lead being the only university that won three out of 17 slots in Nigerian Universities Doctoral Thesis Award Scheme (NUDTAS) awards in 2008/2009, a feat repeated in 2010, 2011 and 2012 joint editions (34). The University equally filed the highest number of patents -20 - in 2024 (35); it has been a consistent high performer in winning National Research Council (NRF) grants (36) and is acknowledged to have the highest research output in Scopus-indexed journals in Sub-Sahara Africa (37). It is the first university in Nigeria to have a Centre for Peace and Strategic Studies (38), the first to have Laboratory to Product Centre (LABTOP), established under the Vice Chancellorship of Prof. Sulyman Abdulkareem (39), as well as many innovative centres. It has the highest number of PhDs in any Law Faculty in Nigeria (40) and it is the most prolific at producing Senior Advocates of Nigeria (41), producing the first SAN Vice Chancellor in Northern Nigeria in Prof. Wahab Egbewole, the current Vice Chancellor (42).

Moreover, the University is a bastion of sporting excellence, the first to host the West African University Games in the 21st century (43), holding the Guinness World Record of the Longest Mathematics Lesson of 31 hours, 42 minutes and 57 seconds achieved by a student in 2025 (44). It holds another Guinness world record as fastest five skin fade haircuts by anyone in the world through another student in 2024 (45) and it is the first Nigerian university ever to host the official Guinness World Record verification exercise (46). It has

contributed many successful athletes and footballers to the country.

At large, UNILORIN is a university with one of the highest institutional collaborators with active MOUs with over 100 institutions (47), its Teaching Hospital is the largest in Northern Nigeria (48) where the first open heart surgery in Sub-Sahara Africa was performed and successful separation of conjoined twins was done (49). It produced a public officer who grossed the highest newspaper editorials in the Nigerian university system in contemporary history as was done for Prof. Emeritus Oloyede when he attained 70 (50).

So many are the fascinating facts about UNILORIN that mentioning 50 is just acknowledging a negligible fraction. Happy golden anniversary to the better by far University!

50 facts that make UNILORIN fantastic at 50

hen the Federal Military Government decided to establish the University of Ilorin in 1975, the government was mainly concerned about enhancing the capacity of Nigerians in sync with the vision behind the Third National Development Plan. Nothing would have suggested then that the university seedling would blossom some 50 years after to a formidable oak in the global university ecosystem, a model for other universities.

As many colours make a rainbow a delightful spectacle, there are many facts that make the University of Ilorin tick, all etching it in gold. As the University marks its golden jubilee with events and activities, including the conferment of distinguished ambassadorial awards on its 50 alumni and its 40th convocation ceremonies, a sneak peek into facts that make the University a fantastic phenomenon is desirable. What 50 facts make the better by far university phenomenal at 50?

Blasts from the Past

Beginning with historical facts, it is appropriate to note that the University of Ilorin started as a College of the University of Ibadan, the first University in Nigeria, which also began as a College of the University of London at inception in 1948 (1).

The first Principal of the University College, Ilorin, was Prof. Takena Tamuno, who was appointed in September 1975 after which he served briefly till December 1975 when he became the Vice Chancellor of the University of Ibadan (2). The second principal and first Vice Chancellor of the University was Prof. Akin Akinkugbe, former Dean of the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Ibadan, who later became Vice Chancellor of Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria (3). The University started from a chalet at No 5, Forest Road, GRA, Ilorin, where the administrative work of the institution commenced in March, 1976 (4). Other pioneer principal officers were the Registrar, Mr Olu Daramola; the Bursar, Mr. I. A. Oyawoye; and the Librarian, Mr B. A. Oni-Orisan with Engr R. A. Imohiosen being the Director of Works (5).

A section of the Kwara State College of Technology was given by the new Military Governor, Brig. Gen. General Innih, to serve as the temporary site in 1976 (6) while the University became an autonomous institution in 1977 (7). With a land mass of 15,000 hectares, the University is not only the largest in Nigeria but also "the largest university permanent site in all of Africa", according to Akinkugbe in his 2010 autobiography, Footprints & Footnotes(p.126) (8). The University started with 200 students who resumed on October 23, 1976 (9). It began as an international university as two pioneer students were foreigners, paving the way for the emergence of the University as one with the highest enrolment of international students in Nigeria years later as acknowledged by the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) (10).

The acclaimed better by far University started with three Faculties under the distinguished Deanships of Prof. O. Awobuluyi of Arts, Prof. J. O. O. Abiri of Education and Prof. M. O. Olofinboba of Science (11). The 200 pioneer students were 61, 108, and 31 respectively in the Faculties of Arts, Education and Science (12). While postgraduate studies started at the University in 1978 with two students in the Faculty of Science, the Postgraduate School was only established on November 8, 1983



(13). The University Library was opened in 1976 and restructured in 1977 with its initial holdings being 7,314 books, 594 journals made up of 1,500 volumes and 63 government publications (14). The current main University Library was built on the Permanent Site in 1990 (15).

Current Crosscurrents

At 50, the University of Ilorin has 16 Faculties which are Agriculture, Arts, Basic Clinical Sciences, Basic Medical Sciences, Clinical Sciences, Communication and Information Sciences, Education, Engineering and Technology, Environmental Sciences, Law, Life Sciences, Management Sciences, Pharmaceutical Sciences, Physical Sciences, Social Sciences, and Veterinary Medicine (16). With over 100 academic Departments in the given Faculties, the University offers the widest range of academic programmes in Nigeria (17). It is the only public university in Nigeria that has recorded two decades of uninterrupted academic calendar, a development that can be traced to the year 2000 under the Vice Chancellorship of Prof. Oba Abdulraheem (18). The University has been the most sought after in Nigeria for more than a decade (19).

Meanwhile, other facts include the leadership roles of the University in spearheading the establishment of associations like the Association of West Africa Universities (AWAU), Consortium of Six African Universities (U6+) and Consortium of Eight Universities in Kwara State (KU8+), among others (20); being the first Nigerian University to emerge the overall winner of National Tertiary Admission Performance Merit (NATAP-M) awards of JAMB in 2024 and 2025 under the Vice Chancellorship of Prof. Wahab Egbewole, SAN (21); and emerging as a most prolific producer of Vice Chancellors, the only Nigerian university to produce three Vice Chancellors in a year, which happened in 2024 when it produced the Vice Chancellors of the African School of Economics (The Pan-African University of Excellence), Abuja; Kwara State University of Education, Ilorin; and University of Applied Science, Engineering and Technology, The Gambia (22).
